

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



TRACY BYRD

Interviewed By Matthew Bretz

n 1992 Tracy Byrd scored his I first hit, right out of the gate, with "Holdin' Heaven" which claimed the number one spot on Billboard Hot Country Singles and Tracks. From there he went on to nearly dominate country music stations with 33 more hits including "I'm From the Country," "Lifestyles of the Not So Rich and Famous," and the wildly popular "Watermelon Crawl." Born and raised in Texas, he still lives there with his wife and children, but every so often he gets the itch to get back on the road. This month that road is bringing him here to Brevard for a special outdoor concert on Valentine's Night at the Hurricane Creek Saloon in downtown Melbourne. Tracy took some time, from his busy touring schedule, to chat with me for a bit and here's what happened.

Last year's tour was all about the 25th Anniversary of your first number one single "Holdin' Heaven." Is there any significance to this year's tour other than to get out and see your fans?

TB: Yeah last year's tour was something special, but this year is going great too. For me, everything is about playing up onstage and being grateful there are still people out there that want to come to the shows and see us.

As I understand it, you have a beautiful family at home in Texas, but you also seem at home on the road. What's the best part of touring?

TB: Well, you know I love being at

home in Texas, but every so often I get the need to go play and so that's what I do. Touring is a lot of work with scheduling, interviews, and all the logistics that go into a successful tour. You spend endless hours on the highway in a bus moving from city to city, hotel to hotel, and the pay-off is only a couple of hours a night in the spotlight. To me those couple of hours make everything worth it.

Speaking of your home state - you share company with a long line of heavy hitters that came out of Texas. What's in the water out there?

TB: (laughs) well first off, we are a huge state with a lot of different cultures influencing what we do. I live on the eastern side right near the Louisiana border and so Cajun music was an influence on me for instance. Hit Austin and there's a strong blues feel. Travel up north and there is a large German population and that's where polka music seeps into it all. You're right though, even going back to early country with guys like Ray Price and Willie Nelson Texas has always had a heavy hand in country music. Then you had guys like Mark Chestnut and George Strait following them up. Honkytonk music has always been a staple for us and it ended up branching out in a lot of different ways because of the different influences and flavors surrounding us.

You went to college for a business degree. How did you end up onstage? TB: I was into music already when I was in school, but I didn't play out anywhere - just in my bedroom. At that time, I didn't know if I was any good. One night I had my guitar in the dorms, and someone asked me to play something. It wasn't too long after that that more people started coming around to

the dorms asking me to play. It took me about two years to realize that I might be able to do something with music. I gave myself about ten years to make it and if I didn't, I wouldn't stop playing completely, but I would go back to school, get my degree and get a real job. Luckily it didn't turn out that way and I got to do what I love. I'm thankful every day for that.

It looks to me like it worked. You've amassed 34 hit singles so far and all you had to do was drop out of college. Out of all your hits, do you have any that are favorites to play?

TB: Oh yeah! There are definitely songs I really love to play. Now, don't get me wrong. There some guys out there that talk about how much they hate playing certain songs, but they have to for the fans. That's not me at all. I don't hate any of my songs - especially the hits. How can you hate your hits? They are the reason I am where I am, doing what I love. I will tell you that my favorites aren't necessarily the fans' favorites though. Most people want to hear "I'm From the Country," and "Watermelon Crawl," but I really enjoy playing some of ballads the most.

Speaking of the "Watermelon Crawl," it has always been massively popular with line-dancers. Who invented that dance?

TB: Back in the mid 90's line-dancing was all the craze. There was even a national championship competition for it. There was a handful of line-dance choreographers around Nashville and one particular couple that everyone liked the best. They came up with the watermelon crawl and a dance for another one of my songs. I had nothing to do with it - I can't dance a lick. I play rhythm guitar, but my rhythm never made it below my waist.



Well, what's it like to have your own dance?

TB: (*laughs*) Well I can tell you I'd like it a whole lot more if I had the ability to get out there and do it too.

You came up through the 90's in what turned out to be a golden era for country. Would you say that's true?

TB: Yes, it is. We didn't know it at the time, but it sure turned out that way. We were all trying to be the next big thing and didn't think about how big country was going to get at that time. But when I listen to stuff from then now, I can recognize true country in it. We had steel fiddles on everything and all that - it was real country. We really owe a lot of it to Garth Brooks. After he came along country started crossing over to other radio stations picking up new audiences.

What's your take on country that's being put out today?

TB: To be honest, I don't really listen to too much of it. It might be my age but I'm kind of set in my ways with the stuff I like. I still listen to new George Strait albums, and anytime my good friend Blake Shelton puts something out I make sure to listen. A lot of the new country just isn't for me though. I listen to the old timers, and a lot of blue grass. Every once in a while, when I'm on the highway, I'll flip XM Radio to newer stuff and check out what's out there. And there are some songs I do like. Newer country isn't bad - it's what country is now is all.

Early in your career you worked with the late great Billy Joe Walker Jr. I interviewed the Indigo Girls last month and they worked with him too

and they loved it. What was your experience like?

TB: Oh man! Old Billy was such a great guy. He was a phenomenal acoustic guitar player. That man could play anything effortlessly. He played guitar on a lot of my early stuff, and then I asked him to produce for me too. We became really good friends. I'm sad that we lost him like we did. He was a real talent. Also a Texan.

With so many hits in the can you must have truly honed your writing craft. Can you tell me a bit about your process?

TB: It's not like it used to be that's for sure. When you are on a major label, they expect a new record every year and a half and they have a really tight system to get it done. Guys in Nash-continued page 16

ville will meet at 10:30 in the morning and have a song completely done that afternoon. They are good at it though, and they make it happen. That's not me, so it was stressful trying to write that fast. Now that I'm not on a major label anymore and no one is pressuring me for the next hit I can take my time. I'll think of an idea, write it down - otherwise I'll forget it - and leave it alone for a couple months before I go back to it. I need time to think and live with something for a while.

Are you working on anything right now? Can your fans look for a new album anytime soon?

TB: Funny you should ask that. Yeah, I've been working on some new material and lately I'm starting to get the itch to record again. We put out a live album last year "Live from Billy Bob's" so there isn't any rush, but I'll be working on it pretty soon here.

That album sounds so good.

TB: It came out great! Sound techs have really put the work in to make live recordings so fantastic now. Used to be it was hard to record a live album, but I am very happy with how this one turned out.

Back in the day, you used to commute from Texas to Nashville to record. Is that still the case?

TB: Oh no. I actually haven't been to Nashville in quite a while. I record in Texas at the *Rosewood Studio*. It's been around since the 70's and produces a great sound. They also have cream of the crop players in their backing band too. I love it there.

So, what can your fans expect from your show in Melbourne?

TB: A great band, a happy singer that can't dance, and all the hits. It's a great show and the people of Melbourne are going to have a great time. Everybody has worked really hard putting this show together and it shows.

Before I talked to Tracy, I had no idea what to expect. But it only took a few seconds to fall into easy conversation with such a genuine, knowledgeable guy that speaks from his heart with all the manners and charm of a gentleman. Tracy Byrd will be performing Valentine's night at an outdoor concert next to the Hurricane Creek Saloon in downtown Melbourne. I'll be there - you should be too. It's going to be great night with a great show put on by a great guy.

The concert has been put on and organized by Hurricane Creek Saloon's owner Randy Bennett along with many helpers. "We have over a dozen amazing restaurants in downtown Melbourne, and I hope people make it *A Dinner & A Show* for Valentine's Day," he says. The concert starts at 6 pm with opening act The Last Call Band, Tracy Byrd will take the stage at 9:45 pm. www.eventbrite.com

Heidi Deleuil Remembered

Some people are larger than life, and so was Heidi. Everybody knew anything about Jazz knew her. Together with her husband Eddie Deleuil she opened Heidelberg Restaurant in the heart of Cocoa Beach in 1986. Heidi's Jazz Club opened next door in 1992, a place that became a destination for everything jazz. She helped young aspiring artists to showcase their talent in front of an educated crowd and hired famous jazz musicians to perform to her audience.

Heidi passed away from a long illness on January 19th just prior to the beginning of a show with TV's America's Got Talent winner Landau Eugene Murphy Jr. His manager Burke Allen posted on social media: "We were asked by Heidi's husband and business partner Chef Edmund Deleuil to carry on and do a great show for Landau's many fans and Heidi's loyal customers, many of whom had traveled hours for the fantastic five star meal and music... It was a very emotional, surreal evening as no one in the audience knew of Heidi's passing, while her longtime staff along with Landau and the band carried on for two sold out shows. As Eddie told us 'that's what Heidi would have wanted.""

The Deleuils left Heidi's native Austria in 1985 and settled in Cocoa Beach, where they bought the cur-



rent Heidelberg in 1986. Edmund was an accomplished chef and the restaurant became known for its fine dining and quality service.

But it was jazz music that was Heidi's true passion, and when she opened Heidi's Jazz Club it was destined to serve more than liquor with a side of music. Soon it became known beyond the borders of Brevard, even Florida, for its quality of music. The small jazz club had outgrown itself and the Deleuils decided to renovate and double it in size. Touring jazz legends had regular stops, great local talent like Sybil Gage, Ron Teixeira, Hella Gal had regular house gigs. Heidi was known for her no-nonsense attitude along with her kind heart and soul. She treated musicians and patrons with respect, and in return she was loved.

When the news broke about her illness, everyone was concerned but hopeful. After all, Heidi was tough. When she passed, it was a shock to our community. She will be sorely missed; her legacy will continue through the people that she loved throughout her life.





Iron Will

Will Walsh had a good year. A really good year. 2019 would prove to be a year where the Brevard native stepped in to the limelight with Iron Will. The now power trio consisting of Walsh on guitar and lead vocals, scene vet Jeff Daughtridge on bass and ex Men Against Fire drummer Jamie Pannucci had a breakout performance at last year's Space Coast Music Festival. Add shows around town and in Orlando and this year looks just as epic. Walsh's GQ looks and guy-next-store's personality don't hurt either.

Walsh grew up in Melbourne. "My dad played guitar casually and I remember music always being a part of my childhood; CCR, The Beatles, etc," he recalls. "My oldest brother started playing guitar when I was 12, and I picked it up right after he started trying

to emulate Metallica and Green Day. Soon after Walsh made the leap from band admirer to band member. "I really do appreciate all kinds of music; I played in a metal bands in high school, but really didn't start taking my playing seriously until after. I discovered the Screamo/Post Hardcore scene and that been my most prominent influence since." Our Never Ending Life featured local musicians Tim Lease, Austin Ficklin and Wayne Wheeler.

"Will was also by far the nicest and most humble band mate I've ever had the pleasure of playing with," remembers Wheeler now drumming for the bands Coldside and Vietnom. "That band was by far the most diverse and progressive when it came to songwriting and material. It was mostly a mix of alternative, progressive and melodic rock. The main guitar player wrote most of the rhythm and changes (very technical and progressive) and was also lead singer. Will was the guy who laid down all the melodic flavor on top of the rhythms and, man, was he the best

at it. All his melodies were beautiful in sound and technical as well which enhanced the songs to a whole other level. That band gave me the opportunity to explore more talents of my own, some of which I didn't know I had as far as writing and playing drums."

O.N.E. Life quickly rose to be one of the bigger acts in Brevard at the time. Although only together two years (2008-2010), they accomplished quite a bit. "We got to record with Craig Owens of Chiodos," Walsh remembers. "That was an experience I'll always look back on." After the band broke up, Walsh took a step back to focus on himself. "I took a break from playing live to start a family," he says. "Rachel and I met right at the end of O.N.E. Life and have been together for 10 years, married for 6. We have 2 kids now." His self-imposed sabbatical didn't last. "After a few years off, I had to get back into it and wanted to start singing. I got reconnected with Spence (Steve Spencer, Southern Fried Genocide) and we formed Lost Satellite!"

Back in the band game, Walsh connected with Spencer and three former members of Jon The Liar; guitarists Jeff Daughtridge and Ian Soden and drummer Kyle Smyth. Daughtridge would switch to bass and Spencer played keyboards; a far cry from SFG fans were used to. The band's energy and harmonies were infectious. Then life happened. "In general it was basically bad timing," remembers Daughtridge. "We lost our practice space due to a hurricane so that put a big damper on things. It kind of just fizzled; everyone simultaneously got busy at the same time with one important thing or another, no hard feelings with anybody." Walsh took the down time to launch a new project where he would be front and center. "I formed the Iron Will concept officially in November of 2018," he states. "After the unfortunate stall of Lost Satellite. I continued to write music and wanted to keep it simple. The

original idea was to play covers, mixed with originals and play through-out Brevard County. A few songs in, I wrote "Anthem" and that's when everything changed. Within one month, I finalized the song, transposed it to full band and booked time at Rocky Water Studios.

The studio session was with an all-star squad: Stu Richardson on bass, Alex Petrosky on drums and of course, Stu & Anthony Fata in production, mixing and mastering. The release couldn't have been more successful, Anthem took home the "Next Big Thing: Best Newcomer" Award at IndieCon 2019, and received airplay from WFIT, WJRR and several streaming channels. All affirmation that he was on the right path. It was then time to recruit a live band. "Will recorded his personal songs, I listened to them and the songs were great," Daughtridge explains. "I let him know as soon as he wants a bass player I'm here for him. I have had a blast ever since." Drummer Jamie Pannucci had previously played with Men Against Fire. "Carlos Santana (Deep Six Promotions) recommended my name to Will," he explains. "From the moment Will showed me the completed project I was blown away and they've been stuck in my head ever since. I'm extremely happy and proud to be a part of it and excited for what are future holds." The admiration for their band mates is mutual. "The addition of Jeff and Jamie was seamless; I put some feelers out and within 2 weeks we started jamming," Walsh remarks. "With the post-hardcore and metal influences that we share, it gives our sound the extra edge it needs. We have national aspirations and it is our goal to continue to build the momentum in Central Florida."

The before mentioned "Anthem" along with "Rooftops" both appear on the Iron Will EP entitled Secrets. As great and catchy as "Anthem" is (Brevard Live CD Reviewer Rob Pedrick called it "a song deserving of national attention"), "Rooftops" is a worthy successor. "It was another song that came together quickly," Walsh admits. "I've been writing for so long that I've learned, at least for me, the progression of the song needs to be natural. If I feel like I'm forcing it, I just save the idea for later. I think I wrote it within two days, showed it to Rachel and she said 'is that your song?!" Others were impressed as well. "In pre-production Stu (himself a platinum selling artist) said, 'dude, this song's a banger!' "Lyrically, like Anthem, Walsh address rising above when holds you down. The lyrics are:

"Is this the way of the world, I can't take anymore, falling down rabbit holes. I'm drunk again on the floor, wasted 9 hours more, no wonder I'm such a bore. I continued next page

swear I'll make it, one day I'll stand on top the rooftops, You'll see, we'll end up moving mountains baby."

"It's about trusting yourself, your instinct and taking risk. The American Dream is about fulfillment, finding your passion and chasing it relentlessly," Walsh states confidently. One thing he is definitely not, is a starving artist. "My secondary passion is medicine. I've always been intrigued by medical technology." He is an orthopedic specialist for a major medical device company where he works in surgery (facilitating, not actually scrubbed in doing surgery). He specializes in upper extremity joint replacement.


Iron Will are poised to make a big impact on the music world. The songs are radio ready and meaningful; those two descriptions are rarely used together. So what does the future hold? "I'm 33, in 5 years my goal is to be a national act," Walsh declares. "We want to have built relationships with the right industry booking companies/ promoters and to be on major festivals like Lollapalooza, SXSW, Welcome to Rockville." As the song lyric goes "moving mountains" - indeed.

The Turing Test

As many of us did, I grew up watching cartoons. A lot of cartoons. And like many of us, I had my cartoon crushes. Come on.. I know many of you did, too. I think my first cartoon crush was Betty from the Flinstones. So, how many of you grew up watching the Flinstones and when Betty appeared, would think, "Wow, she's pretty hot considering she's a bunch of pixels!" Go, ahead, you can admit it, it's totally normal. There's even a name for it. It's called Schediaphilia, that's when you have feelings or romantic inclinations towards a cartoon character. It's also known as Toonophilia. Really! It's true, and it's very common. So which were you? Betty or Whilma? Speaking of Betty's, was Betty or Veronica your crush in the Archie's cartoons. Again, gotta go with Betty. She could shake that tambourine!

Of course, as resolutions got better and technology got better, we saw the likes of Jasmine from Aladdin, Lois from Family Guy, Leela from Futurama, and the oh, so unforgettable Jessica Rabbit from Who Framed Roger Rabbit. I was in my 30's when that came out and still thought "Now that's a great bunch of pixels!" The thing about Schediaphilia is the fantasy aspect. You can make it whatever you want. It's all up to you. You didn't have to actually interact with them in reality, but what if you could? Would Veronica from the Archies really be that bitchy? Would Ariel from the little Mermaid be so sweet?

In the early days of artificial intelligence, reacting to a bunch of pixels and having them react back was a goal to be accomplished. The advent of personal computers and cell phones, I think, accelerated the process. Although graphics technology was way behind, The interaction between human and pixels had begun. In some early video games, you could interact with pixels by typing on the screen and the pixels would respond by typing something back. Cool, but was it really interacting? Not really.

One of the fathers of artificial intelligence was Alan Turing, whom I've previously written about. One of his goals was to answer the question "Can computers think?" This brings me back to memories of my first computer. My brother gave it to me. He always used to say "Remember, it's you telling the computer what to do, not the other way around." Anyway, Turing wanted to make a program

that would interact in a natural, human way. To that end, there was a test devised to determine whether you could tell whether you were interacting with an artificial intelligence or a real person. Although developed in the 50's, we see evidence of it today in those Captcha things on some websites to tell computers and humans apart. This was due to the advent of bots and spam being used on certain websites. Captcha stands for "completely automated public Turing test." You can actually go online, google "Turing Test", and go take the test yourself. You put in a name, and then you have 5 minutes to converse by text questions. Your questions may or may not be answered. There is always some kind of response, though. When the 5 minutes are up, you have to answer whether you think it was a computer or real person you are talking to. It's kinda fun but I could always tell when talking to a computer. I could always baffle the "questioners" when they asked what kind of music I liked. I'd reply "crwth music", which generated some really weird responses. I thought everybody knew that a crwth was a lute-like instrument used by the bards of 12th century Wales. Apparently I miscalculated there. In June of 2014 a computer program called Eugene Goostman passed the Turing test, which means everybody thought it was a real person. This was the first to have done so. Still, just a bunch of pixels.

These days, we see AI everywhere, from Siri like devices to toothbrushes. In computer gaming, there has obviously been great advances in pixel-human interaction, but it really isn't thinking for itself yet. Yes, there are virtual reality games that look pretty dang real. But they are still a bunch of pixels. Moreover right now, the big thing is "machine learning", that is, trying to teach a computer to think for itself. For example, you can teach a computer to recognize a goldfish, but it won't inherently know that the goldfish can't ride a bicycle. Although "artificial intelligence" is a nifty and sometimes scary idea, the day when computers start thinking for themselves is a long way off. Of course, as with most emerging technologies, some of the biggest markets are in either government or the sex trade. On the one hand, AI is being used for data analytics too, say, make artificial posts on social media, spread misinformation, etc. On the other hand, there are Japanese companies that are making sex dolls that actually learn how to converse with you, what you like and don't like, can sense when you're happy or tired or mad. They can interact with you on an almost human level. And they're not just pixels!

Georgia Randall Help Wanted

Georgia on my mind! Yep, this month's review is for Georgia Randall's latest CD "HELP WANT-ED". First time I put it in my media player I knew it was going to be smokin' hot!

Georgia grew up in Virginia and started singing gospel in church at the age of 5. While in High School she started singing professionally with local bands. Her roots are in rock, blues, gospel and soul. This CD certainly reflects this. She performs solo under her own name and as a duo, trio or full band under the name of Georgia Express. She has released two previous albums (*Fly On*) and (*These Days*). At Indiecon 2019 she won two awards, best blues original song for "Fever" (*Fly On*) and best blues vocal for "You Lied to Me" (*These Days*).

Help Wanted is a 10 song must have CD. Recorded, mixed and mastered at *Trebla Studios* in Melbourne

Florida; engineered by Albert Anthony Biele. I hope to hear more from Trebla Studios. If this album is any indication of their product, I have to say we are in for some good stuff to come! Excellent production and engineering!

The players on this album are Georgia Randall (Vocals, Acoustic Guitar), Johan Nilson (Electric Guitar), Michael Elliot (Drums), Julie Klien (Bass) and Albert Biele (Keyboards, Backing Vocals).

This is the second album I've reviewed for Georgia (Fly On). It was pretty darn solid, however, imho, I believe this effort is head and shoulders better. Help Wanted has the "IT" or what I'd call the "WOW" factor! We start right out of the gate with the title track "Help Wanted". A very funky/ soul upbeat tune. Georgia's vocals have an "Aretha" feel. Cool bass licks at 00:25 and 01:08. A nice change up at 01:35 with cool phaser/flanger effects. Johan Nilson, another great player. His lead starts at 01:56. I had to rewind a few times to listen to this lead over and over. Excellent tasteful rhythm and leads throughout the CD. A well written passage at 02:39 of the band resolving out of the lead, back into the main verse.

I swear when I lean back in my recliner, close my eyes, I can't believe song two "Anticipation Blues" isn't Bonnie Raitt! The vocals, the cool slide guitar in the background, gives evidence of the "wow" factor. The vocals at 02:58 show how powerful Georgia's voice can be. Yes, she can really belt them out!! "Motherless Child" follows. A great minor blues tune. Listen to the lead solo that kicks in at 02:07. I'll use this song as an example on how tight the rhythm section (bass/drums) are. Michael Elliot and Julie Klien are in sync throughout the whole album. The kick drum and bass are in the groove perfectly. A lot of young musicians don't realize that the heartbeat of a tune revolves around a tight rhythm section. True for most all genres.

On "Drive - In Fantasy" Georgia

shows just how sultry her vocals can be. If you're my age you can probably remember that we learned a lot about the birds and the bees from the drive in theater that our parents could never ever explain! This tune shows the diversity of Georgia Randall's song writing.

When I met Georgia to pick up this CD she mentioned she gets inspiration from just about anything and everything. "Big Oak Tree" exemplifies this. A cool blues shuffle. Listen to Georgia's vocal range during the outro at 04:07! The guitar playing on this song is as smooth as silk. Unbelievable chops. I hear Jeff Beck style licks at 02:27 and 03:03 on the song "Put it Down".

I don't know if it's within my capabilities to express or write about the last tune on the album "Is It Today". If you've ever had furry kids maybe you'll understand. Georgia's dog, Lui, recently crossed the rainbow bridge. I think it's better that you as a listener give this song a go. Hear it for yourself. Sweet, sad and joyous all in one tune. A great tribute for Lui!

HELP WANTED is one superb album. Georgia Randall just blows this genre up! Outstanding lyrical and musical content. Strong vocals, great harmonies, tight and in the groove musicianship, great production and studio engineering. A very inspirational effort.












Delicious Seafood Served With Space Coast History





It began on October 31, 1948 when Bernard Fischer opened one of the first restaurants in Cocoa Beach.... Bernard's Surf. Bernard was a member of the Fischer family, which owned and operated a fleet in Port Canaveral when it was nothing more than a small fishing village. From the very beginning to their continued success more than 70 years later, the Fischer family has not only served their community, but has hosted astronauts, movie stars and celebrity journalists. When Bernard Fischer passed away in 1965 the family asked his nephew, Rusty Fischer, to take over the restaurant. For the following decades Bernhard's Surf stayed the local hot spot, and Rusty's was added next door which featured seafood and the best oysters.



Fast forward to 1992, when Rusty decided to build and create Rusty's Seafood and Oyster Bar at the port. The view certainly was better, and there was plenty of room inside the



air-conditioned building and on the huge Ocean deck with a tiki bar on the outside - altogether over 6,000 square feet. He created an atmosphere that is truly inviting and relaxing. Rusty's features live music every day starting at 5 pm during the week and at Noon on Saturday and Sunday. The staff is courteous and friendly, it's a happy place for workers and customers alike. There are about 100 longtime employees serving drinks, shucking oysters, steaming, grilling, sauteing and frying the freshest seafood around.

It's obvious: if your name is Fischer, your family used to own and operate a fishing fleet and prepared seafood for many decades - you're committed. Rusty Jr. (photo), who took some time to talk to *Brevard Live*, laughs: "Dad is really picky about his oysters," he tells us. "We get them from Louisiana or Texas, even the horseradish comes all the way from Oregon." One of the signature dishes is Seafood Au gratin (lump crab, shrimp, scallops smothered with a seasoned 4 cheese blend and topped with Parmesan cheese, served with sourdough loaf) - \$14.50. Another one is Rusty Scampi served over penne past - \$19. The menu is plentiful, and landlubbers can order steaks, char burgers, chicken and salad.

Rusty's sons Rhett and Rusty Jr now run the big operation with a wonderful team. "We feel like family here," says Rusty Jr with his contagious smile. There is no doubt, this is a happy place. Together they have survived hurricanes and the down-times after the shuttle program discontinued. These days they don't see astronauts (not yet) but "many employees from SpaceX come here for dinner," says Rusty Jr.. And while you are there, take a look at the walls where you find some memorabilia from the Bernard's Surf era.

Avoiding Negative Distortion

One of the most annoying sounds in the world is the negative distortion made by an audio system. You know, that strange hissing sound from the speakers that doesn't seem to fit the presentation. Sometimes it's a violent scream from the speakers that wakes the dead. Other times it's a slow ring if heard long enough turns you into a serial killer. Most often the band or presenter hears it as well. It can really distract from the job they are trying to do. It is especially hard if while they are speaking they can see the discomfort on the faces of the hearers. As I contemplate this memory of sitting through sound system hell, I wonder, "Why don't we hear or see the negative distortion of our lives the same way we react to audio distortion?"

Throughout my speaking career technicians have explained distortion results when the transmitted sound is poorly reproduced. With audio, instead of a natural sound the system squeals, hums or squeaks. Technicians also tell me, the distortion technically doesn't change the sound as much as it misplaces it geometrically. This means the sound isn't translated to a natural sound. When you are watching your favorite band in concert and sound distortion occurs someone like a sound technician tries to fix the problem. Sadly, when it comes to our personal lives we ignore the problem.

Constructive Criticism

Each day there are negative distortions in the messages we receive. For example, consider the area of constructive criticism. We all have different strengths and therefore translate messages based on how we see the world. Your boss may advise you on how to better do your job or your spouse may give some encouragement on what can help your relationship. Instead of sound advice, you hear the message based on your former experiences. What you think you hear isn't actually the message being relayed. The information is all there, unfortunately it doesn't translate clearly.

I Am Not Enough

You hear what the person is saying but unfortunately sometimes you misplace the information emotionally and it leads to negative distortion towards yourself and others. "You can do better," is said out loud, but you hear, "I am not enough." You hit a place where you think you are not loved, appreciated and cared for. You struggle to find joy because you receive mixed messages and instead of thinking you are enough, you think you are less than. These feelings cause you to want more and never have enough. These feelings turn you into something you are not and keep you from becoming what you can be. When you think you are not enough, you lose patience with others. You think everyone is trying to get something over on you. You also lose trust in others and therefore neglect to be kind. Some lose their sense of goodness and often this leads to a loss of self-control and can lead to binge eating or drinking. A friend gets an award for something great, but you can't be happy for them because you are jealous it didn't happen for you.

Change the Negative Spin

The key to avoiding this negative distortion and stopping the mental spin is to understand what initiates the cycle. Once mindful of the triggers, you can train yourself to avoid it. This is why it takes a village. I may not be enough, but my community, my faith and my family teach me, I only need to do my part. Instead of allowing failures to harm me, they motivate me to hear the correct sound. I am who I am today, because I failed and was willing to listen to the advice of others. People struggling to find peace in their lives are often unwilling to change the negative spin. If someone encourages you to make better decisions, don't hear it as bad news. Use it as an opportunity to better your life. It is so hard to hear bad news but it is much harder to ignore the negative distortion than it is to fix it.



ROCK YOUR HEALTH

WHY Matters!

Here we are, one month into the new year and around this time we start to notice that all those "things" we had planned for the New Year are slipping away. The idea of the New Year's Resolution" has been around for a long time. Around 62 BC, in the time of Julius Caesar, The custom of setting "New Year's resolutions" began in Rome and they made such resolutions with a moral flavor: mostly to be good to others. Later, in the 17th century, the Puritans urged their children to skip the party and spend their time reflecting on the year past and contemplating the year to come. In this way, they again adopted the old custom of making resolutions. Here, again, the resolutions were about not doing harm, seeking peace, speaking truth and being kind to others. How we got from there to losing weight, saving money, being good to ourselves or whatever, is one of life's mysteries. But how that happened is not as important as why we do these things. The "why" we do anything is much more important.

Understanding why we are motivated to do things is complex but it is worth thinking about. I have said forever that "doing something for a reward or fear of punishment does not constitute good character' and I mean it. No one wants to have the nagging question of why someone is nice to you or gives you something. We would much rather know that they are doing it because they feel something for you or it is simply in the character to be nice. And you should be asking why you want to do a thing for yourself too. Too often, we do things for the wrong reasons or out of negative feelings like guilt, instead of because we feel that we deserve a thing. And as a motivator, guilt is a weak one. Whereas, the feeling that we deserve it is strong and comes from a positive place that is based on who we are, what we have done right. If you have worked hard for a promotion or raise, you do not feel guilty in asking for it. Or guilty if you are given it without asking. Deserving something is empowering, guilt is not. And Guilt can shorten your life. It weakens your immune system. A study compared those who had high guilt levels with those who had lower guilt levels related to pleasurable activities. They found higher levels of illness-fighting immunoglobulin A levels in those who took pleasure in activities with less guilt. Guilt also has been shown to increase cortisol levels. Constant cortisol exposure can increase blood pressure and your risk of heart disease, diabetes, depression, and anxiety disorders. So, why we do things is important not just to our character but to our general health.

No one can be blamed for wanting to be in better shape or looking good in that dress, yet somehow many people still try to motivate themselves by making themselves feel bad. Ask anyone 40 years into management about how effective negative reinforcement is and they will be happy to tell you – its not effect at all! And they would much rather have an employee that does things for the right reasons then one that is only doing them for a reward. We are, in every way that matters, our own managers. As such, we should be motivating and talking to ourselves in a way that inspires and empowers us. Not belittling and degrading ourselves. And any good manager will tell you that explaining why its important to do a thing – helps the person in understanding the need to do the thing. It helps them adopt the habit that in the long run will mean less need for oversight. Applying this to managing ourselves, when we understand the why of the thing we want or need, that information alone can motivate us far greater then the occasional metal beating we all engage in.

Past that, understanding why we want things, helps us to sort out and prioritize. It gives us a better understanding of who are really are. Unlike the old resolutions from 62BC, some of these personal resolution might be driven by wrong thinking. Asking why, can be scary but necessary. Are we driven to look some way for our health or to again acceptance in our culture? Surly we would all want people to accept us and judge us by character rather then our body size or shape. I mean, resumes are written, not just a pictures of us with a caption that says..."look, I'm pretty – hire me!". Asking why can help us to find and define what is our true nature and uncovers our true character

Deeper still, it can show us if our motivations are healthy ones or not. If we are talking to ourselves like a friend or a bad boss. Or, even if these things we want are really important at all.

When we understand ourselves in this way, we tend to lead with our character rather than hide it. Confidant with ourselves and our reasons. Others can understand us with greater easy and question us less and accept us more. Then giving ourselves what we deserve becomes a daily habit instead of a list of yearly regrets. Having separated out the wrong reasons, we can start to feel good about who we are as people and that can lead us to places far greater and relationships far deeper than any of the basic superficial resolutions. Maybe, in the end, the only resolution we all ever need is to resolve to understand ourselves better. Ask why & Be well!


THE BEACH BOYS 12 SIDES OF SUMMER

Comics Are Alive and Well with

Travis Gibb

Art is a many splendid thing. Classic art forms are alive and well in the new decade. Take comic books for example. The age old story telling medium of fantasy and fiction is thriving thanks to dedicated followers and cutting edge technology. And people like Travis Gibb.

Gibb is a Brevardian by way of New Hampshire currently living in Palm Bay. "I always loved comics and wanted to create my own," he explains. "I am a story teller by nature. I went to film school and have been very active in our role playing community (think civil war reenactment meets Dungeons and Dragons) my whole life." Gibb's resume also included running a 50 person live action role playing game in Brevard for over a decade. He cites his comic/film influences as Kevin Smith, Quentin Tarantino, Chuck Dixon and Chris Claremount among others.

Gibb's comic book career started in 2002. He was thrust into the spotlight very early on, working with Across The Pond Studio's title Government Bodies. Anthology pieces followed for various companies, the biggest being Negative Burn from Image. "You may have never heard of it but a lot of famous writers got their start with that one." He found himself in the company of future stars of the business including Neil Gaiman, Mike Wieringo, Terry Moore and Brian Michael Bendis.

He would step away from that world to focus on raising his daughters here in

Brevard. He came back to a different version of what he'd known in 2017. "It's a drastic change!," he explained. "It's so different than it used to be. Digital technology wasn't really a viable option. You also don't even need to complete the ART Physically most is done 100% digital and not on a comic book page anymore. Also, you can now print on demand. When you did comics back in the day you had to print a minimum of 1000 now if you really wanted you could just print 5 copies and they are pretty affordable." Gibb doesn't believe that the improvements in production changes the paper to pen creation. "I wouldn't say that it effects story or creativity. It makes it faster and easier to make changes when something doesn't look right. It also allows you to try things and integrate with other media like photo reference and visual effects. The only negative is it's way easier to lose a file then it is a giant art page!, (laughs)".

Another big change over the years was everything an artist did had to be out of pocket. Now we have crowd funding and tons of social media platforms to gain support." Websites like Kickstarter have allowed Gibb and others







to network with other creators/fans online. The releases rely on fan financial support and are rewarded with different perks such as their name in the credits and even character cameos drawn in to existing scenes.

Gibb's current project is the series *Broke Down and Four Dead Bodies*. Issue 3 went live on Kickstarter last month. "The comic is a traditional crime comic in the vein of a Quentin Tarantino movie," he explains. "Two guys who hate each other break down on the side of the road with 4 dead bodies in their car. They have everyone out to get them; cops, gangs, bikers and mobsters. Lots of guns, violence and F-Words." With everyone seemingly having access to everything, he agrees that these stories are for adults. "It's a mature reader comic book," he answers. The plan is to continue the Broke Down story as 4 issues make up a graphic novel.

Gibb is very active in Brevard; both comic book and otherwise. He frequently attends comic book conventions throughout the state. His advice to aspiring creators? "Join a comic book community. Learn and ask questions. They are super supportive." He is also adamant about the order of things before they move to the silver screen. "Don't wait for the movie", he exclaims. "Buy the comic and read it!

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Rigg's Outpost FISHING REPORT FOR FEBRUARY

The key word for February fishing in Brevard County is WEATHER. If the warm temperatures we have seen in January continue and the winds cooperate fishing should be strong.

On days when the wind plays a factor if fishing by boat look for protected areas behind the islands or in the coves around Sebastian Inlet. Watch for tailing Reds in the shallow warm flats. Live shrimp or DOAs fished slow should trigger a strike. If the Reds aren't up for a fight, trout will be a solid target and a fun fight.

If shore based fishing on the windy days, the areas causeways and bridges offer good fishing on the false sea calm sides. Sheepshead, Black Drum, and the remaining Pompano still running the river will prove to be great targets and fun catches for the dinner table. Live or frozen shrimp along with clams and Fiddler Crabs are your best bet for these tasty targets.

When the winds lay down the surf will be strong, with Whiting, Pompano, Spanish Mackerel, and Bluefish being the main targets there will also be a solid number of Black Drum still searching the shore for a tasty crab or shrimp. Baits of choice are shrimp, sand fleas, and clams, with Fish Bites in shrimp or sand flea scent being a solid alternative for an easy to use and keep bait.

Offshore will produce Kingfish, Wahoo, and some Mahi that are still moving through, while the bottom bite will be Grouper, Snapper, and Triggerfish. Just make sure you check the regulations on size and season on all fish to avoid an unwanted fine.

When scheduling serious fishing trips please take the moon phases into account. Atypically the full moon changes the fishing bite to night time. On February 23rd it will be a full moon. Simply most species will feed all night and shutdown during the day. Select species, redfish, black drum and bluefish will feed most of the time. For serious angling it would be best to hire one of our professional guides. They will schedule your target species in accord with tides, barometer and water temps.
