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



Saturday, February 10 Mardi Gras, Sandpoint Park Fran Cosmo

Fran Cosmo is best known as a former lead singer of the bands Orion the Hunter and Boston. Cosmo was first featured on guitarist Barry Goudreau's self-titled solo album in 1980, a prelude to the formation of Orion the Hunter in 1983. Orion the Hunter released an album in 1984 on Columbia Records, which yielded the hit single "So You Ran." The band opened for Aerosmith in 1984.

In 1994, Cosmo was featured as the sole lead vocalist on the platinum Boston album *Walk On*, which reached #7 on the Billboard Charts and produced three hit singles.

Upon Brad Delp's return to Boston for the concert tour (Delp never missed a Boston tour until his death in 2007), the two shared vocals in concert, where Delp said Cosmo covered "the really tough high parts." In 1997, Cosmo was again featured on two of the songs Boston's '*Greatest Hits*' Album, and took an even larger role in the 2002 album *Corporate America*, with the addition of co-production to his credits as vocalist. He sang lead vocals on 5 of the album's songs and played guitar on one track as well.

Cosmo performed in Boston tours from 1994 to 2004, and currently performs in the band "Cosmo", a six-piece band, with his son, Anton Cosmo.



February 10 & 11, SC Harley Davidson, Palm Bay CRockfest

This is the 3rd annual CRockfest featuring a prominent line-up of southern rock bands including Southern Rock's Finest (the band), Preacher Stone (top photo) and the only all female tribute band to Lynyrd Skynyrd, all the way from California - Lynette Skynyrd (photo below), and more.

What makes this festival so different is that there will be no admission charge and you can watch bands all day long. It's due to the "Community Outreach Program" which Tim Bishop has created as part of promoting the Harley dealership. "More community involvement, more entertainment, all that results into more traffic," explains Bishop who took a place of business and turned it into an entertainment hot spot with many regulars who have become the "Harley community." He created a stage for local musicians, some of them with international stardom like legendary guitarist Jack Starr who performs here regularly.

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
Sunday, Feb 11, 2pm, Earl's Hideaway, Sebastian Southern Hospitality & Bruce Katz Band

This is a double-header featuring two international **L** artists. Fresh from the Legendary Rhythm & Blues Cruise, Southern Hospitality will make a stop at Earl's Hideaway for a rare performance. This band is comprised of lap steel guitar master Damon Fowler, guitarist extraordinaire J.P. Soars, and keyboard wizard Victor Wainwright. The three artists are musician's musicians, each bringing a unique style and fresh translation of the great Southern soul, blues, and rock music that came before them. The three principal musicians in Southern Hospitality are each bandleaders and recording artists in their own right and putting these guys together makes for an unstoppable session. Together, their mutual chemistry, high energy and skill sets create a cohesive vision, with echoes of Muscle Shoals and Macon, that organically flows together into an entirely original and dynamic form of Americana, Southern soul roots music with a modern sensibility.

The Bruce Katz Band is the other music legend. While Blues is a very important part of his music, Bruce's music has more angles and influences, occupying a unique space where blues, "soul-jazz", jam-band rock, and all aspects of Americana Music collide into a style of original music all his own. He is equally comfortable playing Hammond B-3 Organ and Piano. Besides leading the Bruce Katz Band, Bruce performs regularly with the Delbert McClin-

ton Band, Jaimoe's Jasssz Band, John Hammond, and other artists as well. He was a member of the Gregg Allman Band from 2007-2013. Bruce Katz has also scheduled a concert at Heidi's Jazz Club in Cocoa Beach where you can hear his jazzier side.

The festival is open to the public. It will be held in the Clemente Center if it rains. Through performances, food and hands-on experiences, attendees will experience the rich cultural variety that enlivenses both the university – home to students from more than 100 countries – and the broader Space Coast community.

There will be a variety of performances starting at noon, with Florida Tech's all-faculty rock band TWITCHY kicking things off. 

Tas anyone ever heard of this guy Wille Nelson? Stupid Lquestion right? I know. We all know Willie as the country singer with the long braids, beat up guitar, and agreeableness to the "devil's lettuce." But, did you also know that his career spans six decades? That he co-founded Farm-Aid and still headlines it? Did you know that he is a 5th degree black belt in Gwon Kwon Yu Sul? Let me clue you in on a little more about this guy. Originally from Texas, Willie Nelson has had, and is having, one of the most colorful careers in music, and media in general. So far this man has released over 200 plus albums, 10 in recent years, including Crazy, Red Headed Stranger, Stardust, and the iconic On The Road Again. He has literally been awarded every conceivable award a musician can get. He has written several New York Times Bestsellers ... including his newest book "It's a Long Story of My Life", released in 2015. The Library of Congress honored Willie with the Gershwin Prize for Popular Song for his contributions to popular music-- it's the very first time a country artist has received it. Annually he throws his own music festival at his Texas ranch called the Luck Reunion food festival. He has a fairly recent album out with Merle Haggard titled Django and Jimmie which debuted at number #1 on the Billboard's Country chart, and number #7 on Billboard's Top 200 Albums. Just for kicks Willie recorded an album of Gershwin covers in 2016 called Summertime: Willie Nelson Sings Gershwin, and it, of course, debuted number #1 on both the Top Current Jazz chart, and the Top Traditional Jazz chart. Just last year he released a tribute album to Ray Price, and wrote a novel called Pretty Paper. The list can seriosly go on and on, but just to cap things off Wille announced at SXSW the launch of his new cannibis company Willie's Reserve. Nelson is currently touring on his newest album God's Problem Child he released last April, and he will be in our area very soon to play the Space Coast Seafood and Music Festival with his touring band Wille Nelson and Family.

His band "Family" is made up of pianist and singer Bobbie Nelson (Willie's sister), Willie's longtime drummer Paul English, world renowned harmonica player Michael Siegfried "Mickey" Raphael, Paul's brother Billy English, and bass player Kevin Smith who replaced Bee Spears in 2011. The *Family* has been with Willie practically since the begining and the shows he plays without them are few and far between. Starting with Nelson's 12th studio album 1971--*Willie Nelson and Family*, Nelson has kept his band close, and they have all shown a serious degree of mutual loyalty.

Born in 1933 Willie Hugh Nelson decided pretty early he was going into music. Writing his first song at 7 years old,

and joining his first band at 10, there didn't ever seem to be any doubt, neither to him nor his grandparents that raised him, what he was going to do with his life. In 1950 Willie joined the Air Force, but was soon discharged due to back problems and went straight back into the music game. He even attended college at Baylor University, but dropped out because music was going so well. Working as a radio DJ by day and playing honky tonks at night it wasn't taking long for old Willie to make a name for himself, and in 1958 he moved to Houston and signed his first recording deal with D Records. During this time is where we get some of his most beloved tunes like Funny How Time Slips Away, Hello Walls, Pretty Paper, and of course the ever classic Crazy. The decades that followed would bring more contracts, and even more hits. Then in 1972, seemingly out of nowhere Nelson announced he was retiring.

But that didn't last long.

By 1973 Nelson had a new contract with Atlantic Records and was off and running again. The years that followed would give us the album Red Headed Stranger, and the critically acclaimed "outlaw country" record Wanted! The Outlaws with Waylon Jennings, Jessi Colter, and Tompall Glaser. The 80's would prove to be an even bigger time for Nelson. While recording songs like On the Road Again, To All the Girls I've Loved Before, and Pancho and Lefty could have capped off a hugely successful career, he wasn't even slowing down. His next project was the enormously popular The Highwaymen with Johnny Cash, Waylon Jennings, and Kris Kristofferson. The Highwaymen is still considered one of the edgiest, boldest supergroups in country history. It was also in 1985 that Nelson would band together with John Mellencamp, and Neil Young to co-found Farm Aid, a music festival whose profits would go to help down trodden American farmers. Inspired by remarks Bob Dylan had made at Live Aid earlier in the year that he hoped some of the money would go to help American farmers in danger of losing their farms to mortgage debt, the trio put on Farm *Aid*, and it has continued every year since - very often with Willie headlining.

In 1991 the IRS came knocking on Willie's door, to the tune of 32 million in back taxes, and seized his assets. Not to turn away from the fruits music had brought him, Willie simply put out another album called *The IRS Tapes: Who Will Buy My Memories*? and used the profits to pay off Uncle Sam.

If you have seen Willie Nelson perform, then you have definitely seen his iconic guitar "Trigger". As the story goes... Willie's friend Shot Jackson offered to sell Willie a Martin N-20 Classical guitar for \$750 when his current guitar was damaged after a show. Willie bought the guitar unseen, only altering it by moving a pick-up over from his broken axe to the new one. He named it "Trigger", after Roy Rogers' horse, and has been playing ever since. Classical guitar typically have nylon strings meant to be played with fingers... not picks. Because of years of strumming with a pick a hole has been worn in the body of the guitar near the bridge. Willie doesn't care, he plays her anyway...and I love that. Trigger's soundboard has been signed by over a hundred of Willie's friends including musicians, sports heros, associates, and family. The first signature, though, belongs to Leon Russell who scrathed his signature instead of using a marker. When the feds were seizing his belonging Willie was most afraid of his guitar dissapearing, so he had it hidden away until his debt was paid. More than once he has stated "When Trigger goes, I'll quit", now that's love.

In the last year or so a new Nelson voice, although it's hard to hear the difference, has been gracing the airwaves. Willie's son Lukas Nelson has been making a name for himself with his band Promise of the Real. Starting out by backing Willie's friend Neil Young on his 36th album tour Lukas and the boys took off bringing roadhouse rock back into the light. I actually caught their act at Bonnaroo this last year and got to chat with Lukas for a minute. Not to take away from his originality, because him and his band are fantastic, but it's hard not to watch, and hear him, and not think of a younger, more rocker version of his father. With his own thing going well, Lukas won't be at the Space Coast show, but I wanted to tell a bit about him so you can check him out.

The Space Coast Seafood and Music Festival will be held Feb 15th-18th in Viera. There will be a wide selection of unbeatable seafood, arts and crafts, a kids zone, a Pirates Festival and Parade, and of course the cherry on top...Willie Nelson and Family. It's a pretty great opportunity to see one of the world's biggest, and most popular performers right here in our backyard...plus the Seafood Fest...I'm sold. I'm sure you are too, so I will definitely be seeing you there.

nce upon the time a girl came to our county. She took The stage with her guitar during a Thursday night jam at Lou's Blues - and put the audience in awe. Nobody knew her name or where she came from but the news about "the girl that plays Hendrix" was all over town. She was an "insider sensation" (before the internet created internet sensations) and people came from all over to hear her jam. She was very private, rather shy, a bit aloof, and soon to be known as Jamie Rickett. She didn't want to front a band or be a rock star, all she wanted was to impress with her music. And she did just that. In 2008 during the 5th Brevard Live Music Awards MC Chris Long presented her with an E.A.R. Award (Excellence in Audio Recording) for her album Summer's Crown. In 2010 she gave an unforgettable performance on the same stage. Then it got quiet, Jamie Rickett had left the scene.

It took a while until she re-appeared, this time with her real name, Alison Rickett. "Jamie is my middle name and I used it as my stage name," she explains in a rare interview she granted *Brevard Live*. A lot has happened since the time when she came fresh from Berklee's College of Music with a degree in composition to Brevard County. "I have been trying to find my place, and I think I found it." And then the bombshell: "I'm studying to be an engineer," she says, "I'm interested in astro-biology and fascinated by science. The universe is in constant motion. I'm curious and a dreamer." That's the fabric scientists are made of.

Just last year in June she finished her studies with a paralegal degree from Eastern Florida University, but "I realized that there weren't a lot of opportunities," and Alison's aspiration flies higher than a regular office job. Creativity and beauty have been very much part of Alison's life. She shares with us a couple of stories from her child hood: "My grandmother had a beautiful home in Maryland with a music room and a piano. I was allowed to spend time alone in this room." And that's where she taught herself to play the instrument. "It gave me freedom." Alison calls herself a dreamer. She loves the beauty of roses, she grew them for a while. And just like her mother she has an affection for the life of the late Grace Kelly, actress and princess, who dazzled the world with her grace. "I read several biographies of her."

In 2013 she had decided to walk away from music as a career. "It became my hobby." There were no shattered dreams or disillusions. For Alison it was simply an adjustment of the direction her life was taking. She is pursuing her dreams of working a job that would advance her in all kinds of ways.

In the meanwhile - here comes the next bombshell - there will be an Alison Rickett Quintet, a band with her name on it and - who would have guessed it - it's a jazz band. Surprised? Insiders have known for a while that Alison's longtime partner is Kevin McIntyre, an engineer and talented drummer, who also opened a new jazz club last year called Half Note. Together with his business partner Ron D'Ambrosi they have been featuring top jazz musicians, among them Kristen Warren, and now - the Alison Rickett Quintet with Alison on guitar, Kevin McIntyre on drums, Ron D'Ambrosi on tenor sax, Thomas Milovac on bass, and JD Daniel on piano. If you love jazz, you don't want to miss this.



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

YYNOT The Music of Rush

After a successful concert with headliner The Bella Donna Project featuring the music of Stevie Nicks and opening act The Vibe, Family Rocks Productions present their next show at the Eau Gallie Civic Center. This time the headliner, YYNOT, will perform the music of Rush. This band has been embraced by the online Rush community, and "we expect fans to travel from other states to Brevard to attend our very first East Coast show," savs bassist Tim Starance who resides in Palm Bay. Indeed, this band has only performed on the West Coast - until this month!

YYNOT was the coming together of award winning, Grammy nominated Guitarist/Songwriter/Producer Billy Alexander (John Waite, FEEL, Ron Blair-Tom Petty) and Florida based virtuoso bassist Tim Starace. After seeing Bassist Tim Starace post videos of his mind-blowing and accurate Rush bass covers, Alexander approached Starace about forming an online collaboration by creating videos of Rush classics. The videos have grown in popularity and have gained hundreds of thousands of views. Their original Rush influenced videos gaining over 200,000 views on Facebook alone. They've played to standing room only shows at The Whiskey A Go Go in Hollywood, Gaslamp in Long Beach and others.

Alexander recruited then 19 year old Rocky Kuner after seeing her perform a jaw-dropping version of Deep Purple's "Highway Star" while she was still in high school!

Drummer Joel Stevenett came into the fold when a member of a Rush online group suggested he and the band work together. After seeing the world -class drummer perform a Rush drum medley on *YouTube* it was obvious this was a perfect match!

'YYNOT' pride themselves on perfectly accurate representations of the Rush catalog as well as a penchant for releasing "Rush-esque" original material that stands up against some of the strongest progressive/hard rock music out there. They were voted 'Tribute Band Of The Month" this year by *RushCon*. Their originals have already garnered national airplay as well as in Canada.

YYNOT's live shows are designed to take the fans on a journey back in time as well as deliver a fresh new spark and bring back the power and majesty of hard rock that the fans have an undeniable hunger for.

Not only is this concert their first

show at the East Coast, it's also their first live performance with drummer Joel Stevenett, tells us Tim Starace. Fads

Fad: A fad, trend or craze is any form of collective behavior that develops within a culture, a generation or social group in which a group of people enthusiastically follows an impulse for a finite period.

Back in the 60's somewhere, we received a little something extra with our Sunday paper. Inside a clear plastic bag was a piece of cloth. As we took it out, we wondered what the purpose of this mysterious material was. It didn't look or feel like any cloth we had ever encountered. It was thin and slightly textured with a kind of waxy feel to it. My mom's first thought, "Maybe this is one of those new mini-skirts!" We all died laughing because the enigmatic cloth couldn't even go around your arm, let alone your body. After much research we finally saw an ad on TV for it. It was a new cleaning technology which was to become known as a Handi-Wipe.

I've seen many fads come and go. Some were whimsical, many were just stupid, and a few were just dangerous. The 60's gave us Afros, banana seats on bycycles, troll dolls, mini-skirts, bell bottoms and Beatle-mania. It was also the era of lava lamps, Barbie, paisley shirts, and the introduction of the Smiley Face! By the way, the smiley face was invented in 1962 by H.R. Ball. The graphic artist was hired to design something to raise the morale of employees of an insurance company. He was paid \$45.

In the 70's we saw the advent of mood rings (I had one!), pet rocks (this is one of the stupid ones), and the phenomenon known as "streaking." We also saw the first mass video game: Pong. Pong was first put out in 1972. The rest, as they say, is history. Of course my favorite fads of the 70s' were daisy dukes and halter tops. Ahhhh.... those were the days. Such was the era of "doing your own thing", "letting it all hang out", and we were all "laid back".

The 80's showed a departure from the groovy 70's. Playing Trivial Pursuit was a favorite past time when you weren't practicing hackey-sack. Care bears or Cabbage Patch dolls was a major decision. After break dancing the night away, perhaps you would relax a while with your Rubick's Cube. The Smurfs were hot. Not! The most revolutionary event, maybe not a fad, was the beginning of the internet and personal computers. Those two things would change the world forever, as we will see.

The 90's gave us tons of new fads. Fanny packs were the sartorial norm. Every kid had to have a Beanie Baby. Probably one of the biggest fads ever! Piercings were popular as were "oxygen bars". The merchandizing fiasco known as Pokeman saw huge success. Rebock Pumps were all the rage. Push pops and ring pops took sugar consumption to a new level. Napster was the hippest way to share music. Things change. The one true constant, things change. I am no longer the kid I was in the sixties and seventies. Hell, I am no longer the person I was last year for that matter. Neither are you. After a few years of sharing my memories and observations in this publication I am feeling the need for a change, therefore, this will be my final installment of Flori-Duh.

I was waiting for the right time to share this one last story with you simply because it is a fantastic accounting of a true experience that many may find completely unbelievable. Yet, I personally know at least eight folks that have had similar encounters and I hold most of those folks in high regard.

It was a week night and the Gator Hook was closed for business. I had been upstairs in my room listening to *Tales from Topographic Oceans* by YES, dad was next door in his mobile home with that year's stepmother. After a while supper time arrived and I made my way down the stairs to the bar's kitchen and proceeded to fix a sandwich, a soda, and some chips. After slathering on some mayo, cheese, and bologna on white bread I gathered my paper plated meal and went out to the bar itself where I sat almost nightly while enjoying my repast. It was still pretty early in the evening, a little after seven P.M. as I recall, but the night falls fast in the swamps. There are no streetlights and very little light pollution to speak of, so it usually seems darker than it is until the moon and stars reveal themselves. But once they do it is certainly a sight to behold!

I look up into the night sky in Brevard and see hundreds of stars and all the while know that there are thousands more that I could see, were I back home. The stars at night in the Everglades are a sight that every one should experience at least once in their lifetime. But I digress.

It was early evening and I was eating and enjoying a Royal Crown cola when I heard the all too familiar sound of a creature walking in the knee deep Big Cypress swamp. I was not concerned as I was safely inside the old wooden building and armed to the teeth with a shotgun and several pistols and rifles nearby. But as I said, "I was safe inside." The sound was usually a deer or a wild hog, or possibly even someone's lost hunting dog trying to make its way back to civilization; knowing that, I wasn't really concerned at all. I continued to eat and the visitor continued its exploration outside. I was safe. Where I sat at the bar there was a window to the west of me. It sat just south of the small band stand and north of the juke box. The building itself sat atop a series of piers or pillars that held it well above the swamp, the floor of the building was approxomately forty inches above the ground but, the almost always submerged ground would sink wherever you stepped by a couple of inches. The window that was nearest me had a bottom sill that was thirty inches high while the window itself was four feet in height. The bottom of the window was over six feet above solid ground. There was nothing to stand on out there either. Just water.

As I sat, ate, and listened I began to get an eerie feeling of being watched

The top of his head was mere inches from the upper sill, his shoulders nearly filled the window from side to side. Considering the depth of the water and the building's height and the window itself, the thing I was staring at that was staring back at me was nearly eight feet in stature. I stood there not unlike a deer in the headlights. I was frozen in fear even though I was in possession of the shotgun. What seemed like a lifetime but was actually a few short tense moments later it turned away from the window and wandered off into the distance.

Being in the music business, and writing for *Brevard Live* has afforded many really cool experiences. I've played all over, recorded in various studios with great musicians, and hobbnobbed with a ton of famous people. This month I want to tell you about one of those famous people and the moments I had with them. It might sound like bragging, but in all honesty it's just a fun story I thought you might like.

Years ago, my band was looking for a studio to record our first album. During that process we got a spot at a big music festival in Orlando that boasted a lot of celebrity guests. Matchbox 20 was huge at the time, and being an Orlando resident, it wasn't a surprise to see Kyle Cook around (Matchbox 20 guitarist). He was leading a workshop about producing, and when it was over I enthusiastically introduced myself and told him about my band. After talking for a bit, it was decided that I would stop by his recording studio the next week for a tour ... which I of course did. Before long we were basically living there, recording until the early mornings and just going to sleep for a few hours before jumping back in. I loved it. We had full run of the studio and even access to all of Kyle's guitars. I could sit you down to listen to our recordings and point out which Matchbox 20 song each guitar

we used had been played on. For instance...when I laid down acoustic tracks with Kyle's 5K Taylor it didn't escape me that it was the same acoustic guitar I had been listening to for years. Or when my lead player recorded a solo with Kyle's Les Paul, we reveled in the fact that it was the same one he played a solo ontop of a piano in the Bright Lights video. We were a baby band, but being there made us feel like rockstars.

An added bonus was that Kyle was always around. He would listen to what we had laid down and offer advice, or just hang out. No matter how much he acted like a regular guy though, things would happen that would always remind me I was dealing with a full fledged rockstar. Once I was headed to a store for drinks and Kyle tagged long for the ride. When we got there he asked to borrow money for cigarettes. I couldn't believe it...this guy has been so successful that his grand kids won't have to work, and he was borrowing bucks for smokes. But that's also an example of normal he is.

Once, before recording vocals, I was sipping cumquat syrup and running through vocal exercises. He asked me what I was drinking, and I told him I had been turned on to it by Ben Harper. Harper takes it before singing, as did Bob Marley. I had seen Ben use it in a documentary, but when I said "Ben Harper turned me on to it", Kyle said "Oh yeah? Cool! Ben's a great guy. How do you know him?". I couldn't help but laugh...I didn't know Ben Harper! He also asked me about my vocal exercises. When I showed him he said he did the same ones...and invoked Roger Love-- the coach who had designed them, and how great it was to work with him. I got those exercises from a CD...not the actual guy.

Upon walking into the studio one afternoon I was met witha hello from Kyle who was sitting on the couch eating Subway with none other then mister Rob Thomas. "Hey Matt, this is my buddy Rob!", said Kyle. "Hi, I'm Rob", said Rob Thomas. "Yes, yes, I know who you are", said I.

And that's how it was. He was always a gracious, kind man, but it never escaped me that he was ultra famous and the smaller world I lived was not his home anymore. Over the years I would occassionally tell people these stories, and many times I got the idea that they didn't really believe me. Then one night, not too long ago, I actually ran into Kyle while I was hanging out with me brother. We caught up and chatted for a bit, and when he walked away my brother stood mouth agape. "It's true...you do know someone from Matchbox 20!". I can't lie...that felt pretty good.

Celebrities are of course just people. People with really interesting, cool jobs, but at the end of the day their servants take their pants off of them one leg at a time just like the rest of us...but sometimes it's fun to talk about.

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






Very often, when I'm looking for an artist, or band to feature in the Spotlight series I visit open mics, and open jams. But, now that I'm running my own jam with KTO at Tracy's Lounge every Wednesday from 7 til 11pm (shameless plug) they often come to me...which is what happened with this month's feature. Harrington calls him the dark horse (he thinks he looks like McCartney), but I just think of him as one of the purest musicians in the area. He has played with, and lead several bands around the county, but no matter what he is working on it's always clear that this guy only does what he enjoys, and what will help him hone his already polished craft. He is on a life journey with music, and I dig that. With a quiet demeanor, a light but precise touch on the guitar, and a smooth rolling voice this gentleman is truly one of our best...and that's why this month's Spotlight is on Jeff Stanton and his new band the Jeff Stanton Trio.

Years ago I had an open mic going on in Cocoa Beach, and one night drummer Ryan Perez walked in with a bunch of guys. He said he had a new band, and could they play a set. I said it would be great and got them set up. What came next was one of the first public appearances of Rex Goliath, and my first time meeting Jeff Stanton. The band became a local favorite and after a short while they were everywhere. Sometime later I would run into Jeff, and Ryan again-- only this



time it would be with the band Honey Miller. With Rex...Jeff was the front man of a melodic rock band pushing the envelope and mixing genres, but with Honey Miller he had stepped to the side to cover lead guitar and harmonies. It was a completely different role than I had seen him in, but impressive nonetheless. You could tell it was a calculated move on Stanton's part to explore a quieter approach to music. Experimenting with country licks, and zeroing in on perfect harmonies was another step on Jeff's journey through music.

Nowadays Stanton has put aside alcoholic band names, and in his own words he is "...working on the performance side of playing live. Trying to get better at connecting with people", and has chosen a more diverse style of playing to do so. The Jeff Stanton Trio is held up by Stanton on lead vocals and guitar, Ryan Perez on drums and vocals, and Corey Yentz on bass and vocals. Mixing up blues, funk, country, and rock n roll the Stanton Trio is more or less a jam band without all the chaos. They have a few originals but for now they prefer playing covers. Never to be one to conform however, their song choices are both familiar and not the normal cover band fare. Even the ones you know very well come alive with new breath when you hear it delivered through Jeff's buttery tenor and ultra clean guitar, Yentz' grooving bass, and Perez' rock solid beat. All are seasoned players, and love what they do...it shows, believe me. Plus Stanton plays an American Telecaster...my favorite. Their music is groovey enough to dance to, and you probably will, but you also might want to just sit back and watch...it's definitely something to see. With all of his time on stage Stanton still comes across mild and maybe even a little shy when you talk to him, but there is always an intensity there that is infectious. He doesn't seem to care much for fame or accolades, he just wants to play (and maybe get paid) and explore his craft...and guess what? He knows exactly what he is doing.

If you get a chance to see the Jeff Stanton Trio you should do it. And when you do take heed and pay close attention to the unassumming guy up front. He is like a living easter egg... always surprising.

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Negotiating A Home Purchase

In real estate, the old saying is that everything is negotiable. That's a good rule of thumb, but not always the case. A seller may just not be ready to part with a family heirloom or a wedding gift, be it a dining room chandelier or a ceiling fan that has some sentimental value to that seller. But you should always try to negotiate the best price and terms for you! Here are some negotiating tips that you may find beneficial when you are purchasing.

First and foremost, get your finances in order. Check with a local lender to determine your creditworthiness, ask about the different kinds of loans, and ask with your lender to qualify you as to the amount of loan you could likely be approved for. And don't forget to consult with your spouse or any other party to the purchase regarding your budget, the price range you agree to concentrate on. It might be advisable to be a little flexible so as not to lose the house of your dreams over a few dollars a month in a mortgage payment. An honest discussion of the amount of commitment each party wants to make towards a purchase is very important, that way everybody is on the same page.

Once you have chosen a house, investigate the recent sales of similar homes in the neighborhood. A good real estate agent has those numbers at his fingertips, or even in his bank in his mind. By checking on the sale prices of homes in the area, you can create a guideline of what a buyer can expect to pay in order to reach a successful sale.

It's a good idea to base your offer on the value of the home, not by what the seller is asking. Those recent sales you checked out will help you immensely. A seller can ask anything for his property, but you are wise to pay at or below the market price that has been established by those recent sales.

It's common sense that a property that has been on the market longer than usual for the area is probably overpriced. Perhaps you can negotiate a really good price due to the fact the house has been sitting and the seller must be move soon. It's worth it to make an offer to a seller with a stagnant property. You never know when he finally realizes that he needs to lower his price to be successful in selling. Always always always try to determine the seller's true motivation for selling. A chat with a couple neighbors may reveal something that could tip the scales your way in negotiations. Developing a negotiating strategy based on both your motivation and the seller motivation is a great way to conduct the negotiations.

Also, always insist on any offer being contingent on a satisfactory home inspection. Most sales these days are "as is" so that seller does not have to make repairs. But most properties do have some minor deficiencies. For that reason, I advise my customers to request a maximum of \$1,000 in repairs, if necessary. That way, no negotiations are necessary after the inspection, and that alone can save a sale, or at the very least save everyone the angst of more negotiations with the possibility of the deal falling apart. If the repairs are minor and can be done for something around \$1,000 then everyone is happy. If the repairs are much more, then buyer can always cancel the contract, have his deposit returned, and find another house.

Once you have found your house, your offer should be in writing in order to hold water. Verbal offers are worthless. Either party can renege on any verbal offer. Make your offer in writing and back it up with a good earnest money deposit. I recommend a 5-10% deposit unless the buyer is obtaining a FHA or Va loan which don't require sizeable down payments. A good way to look at it is that the deposit is called "earnest money" and the more earnest money you put up, the more "Earnest" you appear! I have been successful in many instances when my customer put up a sizeable earnest money deposit when bidding against other similar offers for a house simply because my customer showed his sincerity with his offer by giving a substantial deposit.

When u decide to make an offer in writing, let a real estate agent guide you and advise you. Let him do his thing, as he has experience in negotiations. The offer and any possible counteroffer will always be your decision, but the advice of an experienced agent can mean the difference between getting the house you really want and losing out. Remember that sometimes terms of a purchase can be just as important to a Seller as the price, and your agent should tailor your offer accordingly.

Something to keep in mind... Keep your mind!! Don't let your emotions speak for you. Stay sensible and you most likely won't pay too much for your house.





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You Are What You E.A.T. Part 2 of 3

11 always go back to it. I don't think I'll ever change."-anonymous client

This usually leads someone to recite 'the rooms' definition of insanity and that is to 'keep doing the same thing expecting different results.'

So let's continue what we started last month. This is the second part to a three part series on how to overcome failure and that we really are what we E.A.T. Expect, Adjust, & give Time to. Last month we dove into how expectations can control outcomes and therefore taking a step back from that is necessary. That instead of attaching that emotion to it, creating measurable realistic goals can help us achieve. If the data is reading failure, then instead of giving up or attaching the narrative that you are a 'failure' its time to adjust.

ADJUSTMENTS

Adjustments made when the path isn't leading us to the desired location is vital. Heading off course by inches after a long period of time can turn into miles. Seemingly impossible to get back on course. This is why having the measurable goals are so important. It also important to not settle for less than the original goal.

Not succeeding initially may challenge your interest or desire for the original goal. However, you will get better at recognizing the need to adjust the more you practice this tool. By not being emotionally attached to the outcome having to be the way you expected it to be, allows you to listen to others, learn from others, and learn from your own difficulties.

For instance, if you stand at the bottom of an escalator that is moving downward, you know that in order to go up it you will have to climb faster than it is going down. This visual can help you understand the effort and energy it takes to accomplish difficult goals. Instead of simply expecting to go up, you now KNOW that you will have to do the math. How fast is it moving downward? How fast will I have to step upward? How high is it? How long will I have to do it for? How much physical energy do I have and able to contribute? How bad do I really want to get up this escalator?

The answers to these questions are what dictates your success in the task. Here is how your brain may want to focus on the task. See if you can relate. Do I want to use that much energy? Do I want to look like an idiot? What if I give up half way there? Do I want to experience that failure? Do I really need to go up? Is there another way up?

Your personality type will want to take over at this point. For those of you not instinctually competitive or physical for this particular example, you can still be successful. How? Faking it until you make it. How competitive you are and how confident you feel can overcome many challenges. The task is obviously going to require a level of physical ability and the mind set to believe in that ability. Some of you will walk away from the challenge and simply give up on the goal. Claiming to not really want it bad enough. Maybe thats true. Or maybe you just didn't know that accomplishing the goal is more about having a track record of achieving goals therefore making future goals much easier to obtain, rather than being about only this goal. Yup, practice really does work.

If you would've found an easier way up, you would've done it. The problem with that is that you cannot depend on always finding an easier way. Thats not a manner of living that depends on you and your efforts. That relies too much on chance and luck. You would never invest in a business that is that unpredictable and poorly constructed. So why live your life that way?

The fix? Practice the parts of the challenge the make the goal difficult to obtain. For example if the task is too physical, then practice walking up steps. Build up your physical endurance. Once you have become more physically fit, you will psychologically be more confident to complete the initial task. Makes sense doesn't it? That is adjustment.

Beware of your reservations. They will kill your ability to adjust. Reservations are things that you are unwilling to do for whatever reason. This causes you to take shortcuts and yet think that you gave it your all. To not attempt things that have worked for others because you think that you are different. Success will have you do the uncomfortable, be vulnerable, and to challenge failure. You'll get there. In time.

The menu has remained fairly consistent throughout the years with patron popular dishes such as Grouper Willy, Coconut Curry Chicken, Surf n Turf, Crab Cakes and of course their raw bar stocked with succulent oysters, clams, shrimp and snow crab clusters. Fresh is important so they order their seafood each day from a local distributor right down the street. They have recently added some new fresh catch items such as cobia and stuffed cod and their chef specials are always on the board like the light and delicious Grouper Bruschetta over angel hair pasta.

The accompaniment choices they offer alongside the entrees set them apart and are refreshing change from your run of the mill french fries. Pasta salad, black beans & rice, pineapple cole slaw, vegetable medley, Caribbean rice and hot pasta of the day are just a few options. Start-

ers include the likes of crab stuffed mushrooms, conch fritters, smoked fish dip or warm baked Brie. The Island Fish Gumbo which has a slight spicy kick is always on the menu and packed with chunks of mahi, tuna, salmon and andouille sausage. Caesar and house salads are made to order and can be topped with any of their fresh seafood. If you want it all, they have created a salad just for you named "Willy was a Fisherman Salad" and it comes topped with shrimp, snow crab, mahi mahi and a crab cake. All of the sauces and salad dressings are homemade and you can purchase the dressings to take home. Desserts are not overlooked and include made from scratch Key Lime Pie, Brownie with Coconut Pecan Caramel Sauce, Root Beer Floats and whatever homemade the "Dessert of the Day" is.

Stopping for lunch is like you have driven to Key West for a meal at a local fishery. Even if you are in a hurry and need a quick bite, the ambiance will help you slow down and take a moment to reflect. You just can't beat the view and the service is to match. The lunch menu (11am-4pm) and early menu (4pm-6pm Mon-Thur) have plenty of mouthwatering entrees for under \$13 which makes "eating like a king" very affordable.

Aside from the cuisine and fabulous view, Bonefish Willy's has many highlights including live Island style music each Friday & Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoon. There is a fish fry on Fridays and a Seafood boil on Sundays. Happy hour at the tiki bar, which is everyday from 2pm to 6pm, is a smart time to go because appetizers are buy one get one half off and all beer and house wines are only a buck each. The bar is stocked with full liquor and
