MEETING PETER FRAMPTON

A great opportunity came up when Martin Guitars arranged for a visit with Peter Frampton backstage at his recent King Center concert.

It all started when Danny Snow, our assistant manager at Marion Music, contacted Martin about Danny's own Martin collection (see photo). They asked for photos of Danny and his wall of guitars. Of particular note, the Felix, Cowboy, and Hawaiian Limited Edition models. Even Danny's D-45 is a variation of Frampton's D-42 styled model dubbed The Camel.

Chris Thomas, the Martin liaison, mentioned how much Danny looked like the Peter Frampton of today and Danny mentioned that his boss (me, Bruce Marion) looked like him too. We were both somewhat flattered

when they set us up with tickets and backstage passes to visit.

Frampton's album FRAMPTON COMES ALIVE! is one of Billboard's all time top selling albums. Peter was a key member of Humble Pie with Steve Marriott and later moved onto his own group, Frampton's Camel. His rock anthems *Do you feel like I do, Show Me the Way,* and *Baby, I love your Way* were major arena staples of the 70's. Also Humble Pie's *I don't need not Doctor* and *Signed, Sealed, and Delivered.*

Frampton's strong vocals and intense

guitar work were clearly solo artist headliner material. On stage with a rhythm guitar player, keyboards, bass and drums, his band put out a very big sound, filling the King Center with a stand-up/sold out audience.

Peter is known backstage for his anecdotes, strange voice impersonations in Scotch or Italian and a general good sense of humor, even joking about his own hair loss. We congratulated Peter on his recent Grammy win for Instrumental Pop album and shared some guitar secrets and had a good run of the entire band setup backstage.

Danny Snow is a celebrity himself as leader/bassist sometimes drummer with CROSSOVER and Danny's dad Doc Snow was the 1st DJ inducted into the country music Hall of Fame.

Even as a bandleader/keyboard/ guitarist myself it was very impressive to witness the sound check and interface with their band. Hope it gives SWAMPFOX a whole new insight. Peace!

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


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Who Is Brevard's Favorite

The ballots have now all been cast and counted. The trophies have been ordered and the talent has been booked. The venue is being prepared, and soon the stage will be set. We are now finally just days away from the biggest event of the year for Space Coast music fans and musicians; 4th Annual Brevard Live Music Awards.

This amazing local version of The Grammy Awards is open to everyone (with a ticket) and will be held at Melbourne's Henegar Performing Arts Center on Monday, July 30th. Christopher Long will once again host the event and The Danny Morris Band will also return to perform as the house band. BLACK EYED SOUL

In addition to their 2007 BMA Entertainer of the Year nomination and performing nearly 100 live shows this year, Brevard's hard workin' Americana "poster kids" Black Eyed Soul are also preping for the summer release of their fifth album.

Although they've been nominated for (and won) numerous BMAs in the



past, this year's Entertainer of the Year nomination is of particular importance to the wildly popular "roots rock" band. "2007 marks the 10th anniversary for Black Eyed Soul," group founder and leader Andrew Marcus recently told *Brevard Live*. "We've really worked hard to survive over the years and this would be a cool way to commemorate an amazing decade." Compared to such current chartbusters as Wilco and Modest Mouse, Black Eyed Soul is also nominated in four additional BMA categories!

Before Edgar Winter gave the synthesizer a monstrous lead-role in the song "Frankenstein," and wrote the biker anthem, "Free Ride," he took a little trip to a big outdoor concert in 1969. And it changed everything.

Woodstock changed Edgar Winter's sense of purpose. Before that monumental concert channeled the creative spirits of a musical generation, Winter said he simply envisioned his music as a private art which he used to entertain others.

"I think Woodstock really changed my life," said Winter in a recent interview with *Brevard Live*. "And it marked a whole departure, a whole new musical journey for me. Up to then, I had been more of a serious musician and thought of music as something that was very internalized, my own sort of private world. When I played Woodstock and saw all these people writing and performing songs that they really believed in, it forced a kind of unity that made me realize that music can be a positive force for change, reaching out to people, communicating ideas."

Renown for his engaging stage performance, Winter will headline a concert that also includes Rick Derringer, Winter's former band mate, on Saturday, August 4. The show begins at 7:30pm and takes place at the Melbourne Auditorium. Tickets range in price from \$15 to \$125. For more information call 321-723-1199 or go to Southernjam.com.

Not long after his Woodstock-inspired epiphany, Winter wrote the thoughtful ballad, "Dying to Live," which appeared of his sophomore album, "White Trash" (1971). "The Woodstock experience really inspired me as a writer, inspired "Dying to Live," said Winter. "I began to realize I could do more with music than just entertain and satisfy my own feelings about it. It could really be a bridge to other people."

Over the last three decades Winter's music has cowed by commercial convention and has bridged musical gulfs, melding gospel, blues, funk and rock. Along the way, he has evaded simple classification, probably the cause of his relatively short-lived commercial success, continually reinventing his music and himself along the way. "One of the things that I've tried to do through my career is to broaden musical horizons," said Winter. "I've never been content to play or confine my projects to one particular style. And it's just been an important thing to me. I've never been able to understand why (some) people who love classical can't appreciate rock or (some) people who are into jazz can't dig country. I'm primarily thought of as a rocker, but I love jazz and classical as well."

Winter's philosophy on musical freedom is perhaps best reflected in his song, *Free Ride*. "*Free Ride* has always been a biker favorite. I really have always enjoyed doing those shows and felt like the open road is really a very American idea, a symbol of freedom. I've always considered myself a musical rebel so I always thought of that song as just embodying the freedom to live life on your own terms. I relate to it personally."

Ironically, Winter's most recent chart success comes from a newly envisioned version of that pivotal song, *Dying to Live*. In 2003, rapper Eminem choose to use the song as a sample in the song, *Runnin*, which features the vocals of infamous rappers Tupac Shakur, Notorious B.I.G, in addition to his original vocals. The song was used in the film Tupac Resurrection, which chronicled the life of late hip-hop star, and reached number 5 on Billboard's Hot R&B/Hip Hop singles chart.

"It's another example of what I love about music," said Winter. "The fact that a song that I had recorded back in the 70s, which was basically classically oriented with piano and strings very reminiscent of European chamber music, with a blues vocal, could then be transformed in a unique way, with a hip-hop beat crossing into an entirely different genre; that was really largely due to Eminem seeing that possibility and I think it was really amazing on his part to have heard that song and have gotten it in a completely different way. The (original) message was just about survival, one of the most basic subjects that there is. I thought of it as an anti-war song, having written around Woodstock. Whether you're fighting for your country or fighting to make it through one more day on the streets, it's something we all have had to face and can all understand."

Reflecting the careening trek that is his musical career,

Winter's soon to be released work, which has yet to be titled, will feature guest appearances by icons such as Slash and Clint Black. "We have seven songs that are finished and I'd say there's a good chance this will be out either this year or the beginning of next year," he said. "One of the songs is 'Rebel Road' and features Slash on guitar. I had a lot of guest artists on this project. A couple of country rock things: Clint Black plays harmonica and does some singing. And "Rock 'n' the Blues" features my brother Johnny Winter on slide. It's a work in progress."

Winter is also attempting to get Ringo Star to record Winter's favorite track on the new album. "There's a song, 'Peace and Love,' that we wrote with Ringo Starr in mind. I just did the All Star tour with Ringo last year. That was a great inspiration. 'Peace and Love' is the type of song that has a great universal message, it's definitely going to be included in the project one way or the other. A song that I think is probably my favorite of the whole batch, and a song that I really think the world needs -- a worthwhile message."

Winter and his band are currently preparing the new material for future live shows. As it turns out, Melbourne concertgoers may well be among the first of Winter's fans to the new songs. "I would say by (the Melbourne show) we should be doing some of these songs," he said, "probably 'Rebel Road.' And of course we'll be doing everything else, all the way back to my first recording, Entrance. And songs from my first group White Trash like 'Keep Playing That Rock 'n' Roll'; and stuff from Edgar Winter Group, that indestructible monster, "Frankenstein," and 'Free Ride.""

Addressing his fans, Winter said he appreciates their continued support. Adding in his characteristic rock 'n' roll voice: "So get ready to rock n roll!"

July 3rd At The Sebastian Beach Inn

Hard-rocking blues-soaked guitarist/ vocalist/songwriter Tinsley Ellis, touring in support of his first-ever live CD, *Live—Highwayman*, will perform at the Sebastian Beach Inn on Tuesday, July 3rd. The CD is an Ellis fan's dream-come-true, because as great as he is in the studio, it's the stage where Ellis really fires it up. Ellis' brand new studio release, *Moment Of Truth*, just hit the shelves on June 26, 2007. "Feral blues guitar...non-stop gigging has sharpened his six-string to a razor's edge...his eloquence dazzles... he achieves pyrotechnics that rival Jeff Beck and Eric Clapton." -- Rolling Stone

Ellis' live shows feature extended fretwork filled with melodic and rhythmic experimentation, in the spirit of jam bands like his friends Widespread Panic and The Allman Brothers. Since first hitting the national scene with his Alligator Records debut, GEORGIA BLUE, in 1988, Ellis has toured non-stop and continued to release one critically acclaimed album after another. His stellar guitar work, always a staple of his live shows and CDs, is matched by his strong songwriting and powerful, soulful vocals.

Born in Atlanta in 1957, Ellis grew up in southern Florida and first played guitar at age eight. He found the blues through the backdoor of the British Invasion bands like The Yardbirds, The Animals, Cream, and The Rolling Stones. He especially loved the Kings – Freddie, B.B. and Albert – and

Candye Kane may still be a well-kept mainstream secret but in most underground circles, her diva status is legendary.

She has been making music professionally for over two decades and toured worldwide since 1992. Her background as an L.A. punk rock anarchist and her outspoken activism for the disenfranchised, continue to make her a sought after talk show guest and interview. She composes music with her history firmly in the spotlight, writing songs that inspire and empower. Raised in East Los Angeles, Kane became a product of her environment, dabbling in the gang culture and becoming an unwed mother at the age of seventeen. In spite of her rocky beginnings, which included a brief stint in the adult entertainment business, she never lost sight of her desire to sing. She became part of the burgeoning punk rock music scene of the early 80s. A few miles west of her poverty stricken neighborhood, Hollywood was brimming with musical talent.

In 1986, Kane caught the attention of CBS/Epic A&R Head, Larry Hanby. Kane was initially marketed as a country singer but CBS dropped her when they found out about her controversial past. She continued to write songs and accidentally discovered the brash blues stylings of Big Maybelle, Ruth Brown, Big Mama Thornton, Etta James (whom Candye has opened for several times) and Bessie Smith. The Blues was a place continued page 27

spent hours immersing himself in their music. His love for the blues solidified when he was 14. At a B.B. King performance, Tinsley sat mesmerized in the front row. When B.B. broke a string on Lucille, he changed it without missing a beat, and handed the broken string to Ellis. After the show, B.B. came out and talked with fans, further impressing Tinsley with his warmth and down-to-earth attitude. By now Tinsley's fate was sealed; he had to become a blues guitarist. And yes, he still has that string.

Already an accomplished teenaged musician, Ellis left Florida and returned to Atlanta in 1975. He soon joined the Alley Cats, a gritty blues band that included Preston Hubbard (of Fabulous Thunderbirds fame). In 1981, along with veteran blues singer and harpist Chicago Bob Nelson, Tinsley formed The Heartfixers, a group that would become Atlanta's topdrawing blues band. Upon hearing the band's second release, Live At The Moonshadow (Landslide), The Washington Post declared, "Tinsley Ellis is a legitimate guitar hero." After cutting two more Heartfixers albums for Landslide, Cool On It (featuring Tinsley's vocal debut) and Tore Up (with vocals by blues shouter Nappy Brown), Ellis was ready to head out on his own. Ellis sent a copy of the master tape for his solo debut to Bruce Iglauer at Alligator Records. "I had heard Cool On It," recalls Iglauer, "and I was amazed. I hadn't heard Tinsley before, but he played like the guys with huge international reputations. It wasn't just his raw power; it was his taste and

maturity that got to me. It had the power of rock but felt like the blues. I knew I wanted to hear more of this guy."

Georgia Blue, Tinsley's first Alligator release, hit an unprepared public by surprise in 1988. Critics and fans quickly agreed that a new and original guitar hero had emerged. Before long, Alligator arranged to reissue *Cool On It* and *Tore Up*, thus exposing Tinsley's blistering earlier music to a growing fan base. Tinsley's next releases, 1989's *Fanning The Flames*, 1992's *Trouble Time*, 1994's *Storm Warning* and 1997's *Fire It Up* (produced by the legendary Tom Dowd), solidified Ellis' reputation as a guitar hero with depth and substance.

A move to Capricorn Records in 2000 saw Ellis revisiting his Southern roots with Kingpin. Unfortunately, the label folded soon after the CD's release. In 2002, he joined the Telarc label, producing two well-received albums of souldrenched blues-rock, *Hell Or High Water* and *The Hard Way*. All the while, Ellis never stopped touring. "A musician never got famous staying home," he's quick to note.


Ellis has played in all 50 states, as well as Canada, Europe, Australia and South America. Whether he's out with his own band or sharing stages with The Allman Brothers, Robert Cray, Koko Taylor or Widespread Panic, he averages over 150 performances a year, bringing his fast-moving, highenergy, guitar-drenched performances to fans all over the world.

Seven Mary Three are a quintessentially American band. Guitar - guitar - bass - drums, an arsenal of chords and the truth. This is a band that had a platinum debut and has charted each of their first four albums while building a groundswell of critical acclaim in the process. From that time Seven Mary Three has seen a lot of changes, and five albums later is still going strong.

October 2005 brought a very special personal achievement for the band. Seven Mary Three celebrated the 10 year anniversary of their debut *American Standard* with two sold out performances in Orlando. Fans flew in from around the world to see an intimate acoustic show and a rock show at the House of Blues with special guests and older songs dusted off and performed for the first time in years. And there is no end in sight for the band. With such a strong fan foundation the future is nothing but bright.

It's the middle of summer. Your eyeliner is melting down each side of your face; your perfectly sculpted liberty spikes are starting to sag. You lift your head up and inhale some fresh air, but all you can smell is the sweet stench of burning flesh that has been baking in the Florida sun for hours. Ahhh, for the love of Warped Tour. And it's headed our way, Sunday, July 22, at Tinker Field in Orlando.

This year is lucky number 13 for The Vans Warped Tour festival and that makes me tingle all over. Each year there's a theme and this one is sure to leave an impression. (You won't actually know what it is until you get there.) The Warped Tour is probably one of the safest places to mosh to amazing bands ranging from old school punk rockers like Bad Religion and Pennywise to the funkadelic up-in-coming artist, K-OS. The reason the Warped Tour is usually safe moshing grounds is because amid the "anarchy," there seems to be a basic respect for human-kind in the punk rock community. Often, a band will halt its performance altogether if the crowd gets too out of control. This is something parents should consider if they are a little uneasy about sending there young teen off to this all day festival.

More than just the musical performances, Warped Tour offers skateboarding and BMX entertainment while you catch your breath between bands. One of the best selling points of this tour are the various booths and tents set up all over the fairgrounds. You'll find some with band merch to buy and others promoting social and/or political awareness. Organizations that will be in attendance include Amnesty International, the world's largest human rights organization; an activist group claimed to be powered by music; and a blood donation organization called Music Saves Lives (MSL). If you sign up to donate blood

a few weeks before you head off to the big show, MSL will hook you up with an all access pass backstage.

Thirty something wellknown bands for under thirty bucks is a value that continues to beat out every other big name music festival around. And the fest still manages to incorporate tons of the best local acts in the central Florida area as well. With too many scheduled to mention, here's a short list of artists you can not miss: Bayside, Killswitch Engage, K-os, New Found Glory, Paramore, Red Jumpsuit Apparatus, Tiger Army, Yellowcard. Warped Tour Spotlight: NORMA JEAN

One of the heavier components of the Warped Tour event is the Atlanta-based band Norma Jean. The group's latest disk, "Redeemer," combines potent melody and blistering metal to create a unique and overpowering combination.

At the end of 2006, drummer Daniel Davidson said that the album's title reflected the band's Christian roots: "We thought it was just really powerful. Also, we are all Christians in the band. So redeemer is obviously a synonym for Jesus. That is one aspect of the word, but not really the only reason."

Whereas some heavy bands have been known for conveying viewpoints that are blatantly opposed to organized religion (Slayer, Brevard's own Diabolic Intent), Norma Jean's music is imbued with a sacred import. "In some aspects, every song ties in to (Christianity)," said Davidson. "That is where we want to be with the focus of our band. What we strive to be, the focus of our individual life, naturally flows over into our band and what we want to talk about. That passion drives our music and the reason we play with that intensity. We have a passion for what we believe in and our love for God."

Whereas the band had once toyed with rap-core metal, "Redeemer" represents a musical departure from Norma Jean's previous records. "This record is definitely my favorite record of the three we've done," said Davidson. "I think again we've just kind of stepped it up a notch, doing something new that we've never done before. Even just for us, personally."

"One reason our music changes with each record is to keep it fresh and to keep our interest in it. Because we are all changing a lot as individuals, we change our ideas and the kind of music we're into at the time. I think this one will appeal to a lot more people, not that we're trying to write a record so everyone will like it. In fact, this record has some of the heaviest parts we've ever written."











We Asked Three Participating Bands HOW WAS THE FLORIDA MUSIC FESTIVAL?

n May, a handful of local bands etched Brevard in the minds and ears of concertgoers at the Florida Music Festival, reminding them that reminded Orlando isn't the only music scene in central Florida. To commemorate their accomplishment both as individual artists and as ambassadors to their hometown, Brevard Live asked the bands a few questions about their experience playing the renown festival.

What was the most memorable moment of the FMF?

Robert Allsopp, Bravo Armada: The most

Nathan Walter, A Denver

Mile: Completion. It always feels good to hit that last note in your set and know that you did it well. That was especially true during FMF. Rob (bass) was sick, we had to borrow equipment, and most of the event managers were stressed, which definitely effects the mood of the bands. It feels pretty good to overcome all of that nonsense and put on a good show.

How was the crowd response?

Bravo Armada: Although the number of people there probably wasn't large enough to be considered a crowd by any definition, a decent percentage of them still came up and shook our hands. We would even venture to say that most of them seemed somewhat enthused about our music while we were playing. We figure if we were playing to a stadium full of people and the same ratio of them enjoyed our set then we'd be more famous than Britney Spears.

The Victory Chords: Well we played the Back Booth to our Orlando crowd so it was a pretty normal show -- rocking, drinking, repeat!! The real response and benefit is having your name involved with the festival. Even if someone didn't go to your show they probably saw your name and maybe after seeing your name over and over they might give you an open ear.

A Denver Mile: With so many bands in the lineup, you tend to play for some people who came specifically to see you, and others who have no clue who you are. We definitely won some people to our side.

Do you feel like a rockstar yet? Bravo Armada: Not quite. We're waiting on that stadium full of people. The Victory Chords: After all the ups and downs I've seen in the central Fl music scene we're grateful just to grab their attention, even if its only 30 minutes of glory. A Denver Mile: I sincerely hope that we never feel like rock stars. Once you feel like





a star, you tend to act like others should treat you like one.


How did it feel to represent the Brevard scene?

his is the story of Ed and Elaine Brown, senior citizens L of Plainfield, New Hampshire. where women had colorful pasts - many were plus sized. Most had grown up in oppressive, horrible circumstances and yet were still able to make music and celebrate their sexual lives. Candye Kane found a home in the blues. Since her first Antones' release, *Home Cookin*' in 1992, she has recorded 7 CDs.

Candye's live show is the stuff of legend. She honors the bold blues women of the past with both feet firmly planted in the present. She belts - growls - shouts - croons and moans from a lifetime of suffering and overcoming obstacles. She'll deliver a barrelhouse blues tune or a soulful ballad and then slay the crowd with her balls out rendition of "Whole Lotta Love" Led Zeppelin style. She often says she is a "black drag queen trapped in a white woman's body" and she dresses the part. Bedecked in bright colored feathers, sequins and rhinestones, Kane's performance is Mississippi by way of Las Vegas with a quick stopover in San Francisco.

Awards include the Best Blues Band award at the San Diego Music Awards 7 times including 2006. Other recent honors include winning an OUT music award in 2006 for best art design for her 7th CD, White Trash Girl; Best Blues CD of 2005 at the San Diego Music Awards; the Trophees France International Award 2004 for Best International Blues Chanteuse and Artist of the Year. She also unseated Jewel for Artist of the Year at the San Diego Music Awards and won the California Music Award for Best Swing-Cabaret Artist.


Her audience is a mixture of the disenfranchised: bikers, blues fans, fat girls, queers, porn fans, feminists, men who love fat girls, rockabilly kids and everyday folk flock to see Candye and hear her message of love and empowerment. Yes, her story reads like a made for TV movie or an episode of the Jerry Springer show. But Candye Kane's story is 100% non-fiction. She persevered in spite of the people who discouraged her and tried to force her to conform. She survived her own way, on her own terms.

MR. BROOKS

Starring: Kevin Costner, William Hurt, Demi Moore, Dane Cook & Marg Helgenberger. Running Time: 120 Minutes. Rated: R

Be forewarned! This is not your average Costner flick. The all American Gary Cooperesque actor and Oscar winning director plays Earl Brooks. He is a Portland, Oregon executive business "man of the year" type by day and a clever and sinister serial killer by night. He has an alter ego played by Oscar winner Hurt who creepily talks Brooks into committing murder. The exchanges between these 2 Academy Award winners are a hoot. Mr Brooks is married to Marg Helgenberger from TV's CSI.

She is oblivious to the fact that her mate is a cold blooded killer. His daughter Jane is another story. Let it suffice to say that she is a chip off the old block. After having been on a murder hiatus for several years, Mr Brooks, at the urging of his inner voice (Hurt), gets back in the saddle and kills again. Only this time there is a witness (Cook), a photographer from across the way who manages to photograph Mr Brooks in action. He doesn't want money, he wants to experience the killing business under Mr Brook's tutelage. Investigating the murder is Atwood (Moore), an attractive hot headed detective who is undergoing a nasty and potentially expensive divorce. All these components add up to a very different kind of murder movie, with Hurt's role as the cackling puppet master shining.

The first half of the movie takes you on a fascinating ride of the dastardly deeds of Mr Brooks, but falls apart like trying to dig a grave with no shovel. B-










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SOUNDS OF THE UNDERGROUND TOUR

Those of you looking for a great metal show are in luck. The **Sounds of the Underground Tour** will land at Orlando's UCF arena on Tuesday July 10th. And for those of you who are too broke and/or are having difficulty waiting for Ozzfest (August 30 West Palm), this is great alternative. This tour is stacked with a roster of talented metal contenders that has no trouble standing-up to Ozzfest's current lineup. Bands scheduled to play the July 10th show include: Gwar, Shadows Fall, Chimaira, Every Time I Die, Necro, Job for a Cowboy, Darkest Hour, Amon Amarth, The Acacia Strain, The Devil Wears Prada, Heavy Heavy Low Low, The Number Twelve Looks like You, Goatwhore and This is Hell.

One of the last times *Every Time I Die* passed through Central Florida, *Brevard Live* spoke to the band's front-man, Keith Buckley. At the time Buckley had a lot to say about current music trends: "I can't even stand watching TV or listening to music," he said. "I was watching MTV... just terrible bands that are on."

While many bands tend to avoid directly criticizing specific bands, Buckley is as bold as his music. "Specifically, it was Hawthorne Heights. We had a day off yesterday so me and the guys in the band and some of our friends were watching TV and that band came on, we were awestruck. It was really just a pathetic abuse of music, I don't mind saying."

In 2005, *Every Time I Die*'s album, "Gutter Phenomenon," was praised by rock magazine, *Revolver*, as album of the year, and even merited mention by the *New York Times*.

Buckley laments that fashion and pretty faces play such a significant role in crowning today's rock stars. "What's most (unfortunate) is that music is no longer just about sound at all. If this were the days of the radio nobody would be selling records because these kids are selling records based on what they look like. They're basically more of actors than musicians. I don't want to be an actor at all, ever."

JAMIE RICKETT: CLASSIC ROCK OUTSIDE OF THE BOX

A fter paying her dues playing countless jams and sitting in with other bands, local guitar guru, Jamie Rickett, will make her debut as bandleader this month. On Sunday, July 15th, Rickett will bring a uniquely all-woman cast that includes Naome Bradshaw (lead vocals), Karen Toledo (drums) and Jules Larson (bass guitar/vocals) who is a member of Orlando cover band, Control Freak, to Lou's Blues .

Rickett said that the band will perform "the best classic rock that nobody does around here, yet Brevard fans of 60's-80's want to hear." "I think people are hungry for classic rock," said Rickett. "Most bands doing it are playing the same old stuff. It's the music that's easy to play. How often do you hear bands playing difficult songs like "Barracuda?" Naome can sing anything."

Rickett is particularly interested in seeing to it that her set-list reflects the expanded definition of classic rock. "Basically I'm trying to get rid of the stereo-type of classic rock," she said. "Classic rock encompass more than Lynyrd Skynyrd and the Doobie Brothers. I like to play classic music from bands like U2 and later 80s music that can be considered classic rock." Other artists you can expect to hear covered at the show include: Heart, Boston, Journey, Van Halen and Aerosmith.

Aside from the unique variety of songs, Rickett also promises a passionate, uplifting performance on her part. "I love to perform and I love to play guitar," she said. "People pick up on that. People enjoy it; people are uplifted.

"I'm not saying I'm any better than anyone else around here. I don't take credit for it, I'm the instrument. On a really good night, something is playing me."

SHEBANG: RETURN OF THE METAL LADIES

On Saturday, July 14th, heads will bang and hearts will pound as Orlando-based Shebang returns to Melbourne with its stylish music that bridges punk, modern and throwback rock. Comprised of Gina Longo (vocals and guitar), Deb Cox (lead guitar and backing vocals), Kristen Hart (bass and backing vocals) and Rhonda Atkisson (drums and backing voice), the all-woman band is slated to perform at 9pm, at the Metro. Tickets are \$5.

The show will be particularly special since the women will for the first time unveil their album, "Pretend Not to Notice," which was produced by Brett Hestla (Dark New Day, Virgos Merlot, Creed). "This will be the first show we play when we will actually have the new CD with us," said front woman, Longo. "We're so excited about it."

Concertgoers will have the opportunity to purchase a CD and t-shirt package for just \$10. "The CD has 12 songs so that's not such a bad deal," said Longo.

Not just 12 songs, but 12 head-spinning, hook-laden songs that recall 90's alternative rock -- fans of the Breeders will be pleased from start to finish. "I'm from New York," explained Longo, "I grew up on the Ramones and a lot of the bands that were playing downtown New York at the time. I was also influenced by the Pretenders, Blondie and Patti Smith. Those were some of the first records I bought. A lot of that stuff definitely stuck."

Shebang's last gig at the Metro, a few months ago, was the band's regional live performance debut. "When we played (Melbourne) last time, it was our first venture out of Orlando," said Longo, whose vocals have been compared to those of Patti Smith. "We were exited about the way everything went. The room was pretty full and a lot of the people that came, came via myspace. A lot of people heard our music on myspace and came to the show. We seemed to get a really positive reception. And I'm hoping all those people will come back to see us and maybe bring a friend or two. We're hoping to grow the following in Melbourne."

Gaining ground quick, Shebang also received exposure during the 2007 Guitar Gals Battle. "We didn't win but we were thrilled that we got to the finals," said Longo. "It was a great way for a lot of people to be exposed to our music. It really helped us a lot. They had several different categories, indie, punk, jazz, pop, competing in each category. From all over the country. All of it was based on votes and we got into the finals in the indie/alternative genre."

Taking into consideration Longo's long-time infatuation with the guitar, it's appropriate that Shebang would be recognized in a guitar-playing contest. "The roar of the loud guitars is the first attraction for me," she said. "To me there's nothing like a Les Paul through a Marshal cranked up with the right amount of crunch on it. And then to be able to write memorable songs is the other attraction. And the attitude is the other thing that would go in with it. Rock has always been about rebellion."

Rebellion, or marketing for that matter, however, had

nothing to do with Longo organizing an all-woman band. "I never tried to put an all-girl band together," she said. "I thought to get four people who can actually get along and stand each other and play together, that's hard. To get four women together, that's never going to happen. Then I met Deb about four years ago. I knew she was a great guitar player. Things happened just by meeting one person and then another. It's just a coincidence we were able to make the all-girl thing happen."

Playing solid, invigorating rock 'n' roll is Shebang's first and only priority. "The music comes first," said Longo. "We want to be the all-girl rock band that people say, 'Wow, they make great rock music.' We're not out there to be cutesy or sexy."

If you make it to the concert, Longo said you can expect an adrenaline charged concert. "We don't play a song, stop, drink a beer, talk to the audience, tell them to tip the bartenders and then play another song. We get up there and we slam from one song to the next, and it's just a 50-60 minute assault of, hopefully, memorable songs. When people start bobbing their heads up and down, we just don't want them to stop. I hate too long of pauses."

Though Shebang is principally an original band, Longo said there might be a few surprises in store. "We do a pretenders cover from "Previous" off the first Pretender's record," she said. "I love the edge of it and the attitude of it. It's a cool song. And we have experimented with one Blondie song, "One Way or Another." We also do a Joan Jet song, "I Hate Myself for Loving You."

It looks like a big VIP room with sheer curtains, sofas and candles. The bar itself is stylish—it changes colors and has a ridge filled with ice to keep your frosty beverages cool. The bonus—the barstools adjust in height! Even the bathroom entrances are decked out—they have his and her chrome lights.

Some of the martinis they serve are: G-Spot Tini with Three Olives grape vodka, grape liquor and sprite; Bellini Tini with Champagne, Vodka and Peach Schnapps and Blue Vibe with Bacardi rum, Cruzan coconut rum, Blue Curacao and pineapple juice. They all sounded good, but I opted for the Pomegranate Tini with Hangar One vodka, PAMA pomegranate liquor and cranberry juice. My friend went decadent with her White Chocolate Tini with Stoli Vanilla vodka, Godiva white chocolate liquor, white Crème de Cacao in a chocolate swirled glass. They also serve non-martini drinks as well as beer and wine.

Cush opened in February and is located directly behind Slow and Low Bar-B-Q. They're open Wednesday through Saturday from 8 pm-2am. Every Wednesday is Ladies night with 2 for 1 martinis and Thursday nights are "Level Thursdays" with \$5 Level Vodka martinis.


4th Wall Broken at Captain Hiram's



ROBIN ROTHROCK

You don't need to ask Robin Rothrock to name her favorite color. It's obvious. The bricks on the outside of her gallery declare her fondness for bluephthalocyanine blue to be exact-and her paintings are alive with it. This may be due to growing up in Satellite Beach and, as a young surfer, falling in love with the sky and the ocean.



B orn in San Angelo, Texas, she moved to Satellite Beach in 1961 when her father became the chief operating pilot for NASA operations at the start of the space program. Because science was such a big thing in the family, art was not stressed while Rothrock was growing up.

In junior high she was the designer of the year book, and in high school she was the editor of the year book. These tasks awakened her love of design. Still, life intervened and she didn't pursue artistic interests for a number of years.

Instead, she was busy earning a degree in psychology. After she received her degree from the University of West Florida, Rothrock moved back to Satellite Beach and worked first for Big Brothers and Big Sisters as a social worker, and then went to work for the county. Part of her job was to help women who had a child or two. She took them from public assistance to employment. Meant to help others, Rothrock was next asked to open a women's health clinic in Shreveport, Louisiana. She struggled with the decision to move since she loved the ocean so much, but she did make the move.

While in Shreveport, life's grand design came together to make art possible. Centenary College was located behind the health clinic. She met Bruce Allen, the head of the art department who specializes in printmaking and sculpture. He suggested she audit art classes. She did and she's been producing beautiful paintings ever since.

She started with a painting of Eudora Welty, which led to a series of portraits. That was the beginning, but eventually she found realism too tedious. She wanted to be freer, so she experimented with handprinting (sometimes known as "squish art") and moved toward expressing herself in more impressionistic and abstract styles. In those days, she used acrylic paint on brown paper and instead of rolling the paint with a glass or roller, she used her hands. Landlocked in Shreveport, she had found a way to recreate the beauty and depth of the sky and the ocean she missed.

Allen worked with her at that time and suggested she use heavy watercolor paper. She completed nine squares (one foot each) and showed them to Allen for critique. He asked her to give him 144 squares, all in blue and white. Those paintings were displayed in conjunctrion with a group performing a dance performance piece. That was the start. Those pieces, which were originally created in blues and then later in purple and in black, began to sell. They were on paper and framed under glass.

Rothrock returned to Satellite Beach a couple of years ago. After surgery for breast cancer, she decided to stay in the family home in Satellite Beach during chemotherapy. She says that her painting was very therapeutic throughout her treatment. It calmed her, reduced stress, and even lowered her blood pressure. Doctors were amazed and encouraged her to continue. Now in remission, she is thankful she had and has her art. Rothrock admits that her illness has helped to keep her priorities straight. Painting is personal. She likes to create some tension and mystery through her paintings. Above all else, she knows she must stay true to what she wants to do. She describes her art as freer now with just enough tension to play a bit with your brain.

During her recovery, she took a class from Frits van Eeden at the Renee Foosaner Education Center, Museum School. When she saw him pressing gesso, she connected with him immediately. In that class, she learned a lot about stylistic, classical painting. She credits van Eeden with helping her make the transition from paper to canvas and with encouraging her to use larger canvasses. She feels liberated to have her artwork out from under glass.

Although she has taken classes from van Eeden, she says that there are marked differences in their approaches. She said that the main difference between their methods is that he knows what the end product will be when he starts a painting. She often takes the approach of a process artist she doesn't know and often doesn't want to know where she is going with a piece.

Now, when she works with the squish art technique, she prepares by jumping in the hot tub to wet large pieces of watercolor paper, and then she begins her magic. In addition to this unusual technique, Rothrock chooses unusual surfaces. For example, she has painted boxes and made them into cube paintings, and she has created a wonderful piece by painting on wood slats and lining them up on a wall to make one painting. Now, she is experimenting with woven pieces where she cuts her paintings into long strips and reworks them into new and interesting paintings. The result is beautiful.

As her painting progressed, Rothrock decided to open her own gallery. It's called Highway Grrls Gallery and Studio and is at 1414 Highland Avenue in Eau Gallie. Her work is also at the Foosaner Museum School Gift Shop. Rothrock has a second gallery called Highway Grrls West. It is located in downtown Shreveport at 327 Market Street. Other works of hers are currently shown at Bella Fresca Restaurant and at West Edge Artists' Co-op in Shreveport. Rothrock spends most of her time in Florida, but she goes to Shreveport every three months for three weeks.

In Florida, Rothrock supports the community of artists by belonging to the Strawbridge Art League and to the Brevard Art Museum. She had a piece in the 2007 Juried Show at the Brevard Art Museum.

It's often funny the things that come to mind when you think of someone, things that just pop into your head when you least expect it.

For example, I was sitting watching a video of Dave Fiester. Someone was kind enough to send it to me and I watch it often. So many things run through my mind as I sit and watch Dave play, and I wonder and ask questions about things that I will never know the answers to. And other times things come to mind that I just have to ask myself, where in the world did that come from?

The video I happened to be watching was a video of the Henry Paul Band and Dave was playing a solo and just tearing it up. That was nothing different or unusual, it was just Dave. But what



seemed to catch my attention and stir my curiosity while watching the video was, "why hasn't he broken a string?" (this was a video of a live concert). Back in the early days Dave never seemed to make it through an entire set without breaking a string on his guitar, and it was always extremely frustrating for him, rushing around trying to replace the broken string (hoping he had an extra one of the right gauge) while continuing to try to play, which of course at some point would become impossible. That meant having to tune up while the rest of the band continued playing, not something most guitarists cared to do since everyone in the audience could hear. This was a time when we had no idea that the technology of music could ever become more advanced than it was at that time, especially to the extent it has. They didn't have the guitar tuners of today that just plug into the guitar and a little light comes on to let you know your strings are tuned, all while your sound is turned down so as not to be heard). Instead the guitarist would have to stand there and tune by ear, pitch pipe, or both, which took longer and could have a pretty nasty sound to it, and you had to keep your volume to hear whether or not you were in tune. I never noticed that it was a big deal to the audience, but it was one of the worst things that could happen to Dave at that time, being right up there with hitting a really bad note. He would always ask me, "why doesn't John (Lane) ever break a string" and then smile. The answer was simple, John played bass with strings as thick as piano strings, but he did actually manage to lose a couple while playing. Silly as it may sound, that memory really sticks in my mind and I have to smile when I think about

wasn't for lack of playing just as hard and giving those strings a good work out.

Bl *s*eries

People have such varied things they enjoy remembering of others. Larry Thorne (known as "Sparky" to his friends or anyone who wishes to call him that) has just returned to the area after being gone for a time, and has many memories of Dave and the times he shared playing with him. It seems to make Sparky happy to remember practices with Dave and Bill Hoffman during the early incarnation of the band "Tight Shoes". They would sit around Bill's stereo listening to songs such as "Dixie Chicken", "Oh Atlanta", as well as "Pack It Up" and "I'll Be Doggone", two songs Dave would become known for. The first song I ever associated with Dave and still do to this day is "Key to the Highway" (also very appropriate as we were traveling all over the southeast in "Smiling Sideways" and "Fresh Squeezed"). That was a long time ago, and until I requested Dave to play it for me one night at the Corvette Lounge where he and Mark Glisson were doing a duo, it had been a long time since he had played it. But he was more than happy to go back in time musically to

it, and one of the things I suppose I will never know, but I have to wonder is, how did Dave play all night long in later years, with all his guitar strings intact when it was time to play that last note of the night? It

a song he obviously also enjoyed. The smile he got on his face said it all. When Dave started to play and sing it was the same for me as it had been 30 years before, but even more special due to the fact that the days of hearing him do it most every night were in the past.

I spoke of Larry "Sparky" Thorne before. I met him during the first "Memorial Concert for Dave Fiester" (one of the musicians who played in honor of Dave). He had played in numerous bands with Dave, and they called each other friends. I have spent the last 2 years getting to know Larry via email until his recent return to Brevard.

Larry was introduced to Dave by Steve Bland who became well known in "The Fantastic Group", but moved on to other bands which made a pretty big name for themselves, like "The Tasmanians" and "New Days Ahead". Steve was leaving "New Days Ahead" just as "Fresh Squeezed" was dismantling (1975) and Dave was looking to put another group together. So instantly Larry (on guitar), Steve Bland (keyboards) and Dave became "Stockyard", along with Randy Dix on bass and Ron Barfield on drums. They found themselves a little place in Merritt Island called "The Cork Club", and it was there they played, practiced and got their band together until they were ready to come out in the open. And at this particular time, the first place you went was straight to the Satellite Beach Motel, "Pillow Talk Lounge", and as Larry puts it, "the world of Tom Burkhead". I always thought of Tom as the guy who knew every button to push to make Dave want to give up playing rather than play there, but of course that wasn't going to happen. So Dave adjusted, and we always made sure there was at least one person that could step in between them at any given time. "Pillow Talk" was never known as an easy gig to play (but yet every band in Brevard stood in line to get in). The band played 7 days a week way into the early morning hours, until everyone finally left, or the band couldn't take it any more ("Ladies Night" had to be the worst). 6 hour long

sets during the week and 6 1/2 on Friday and Saturday nights. I got to experience this club from every aspect, someone there to hear the band, going with the bass player of the band (John Lane), and best of all, my career as a cocktail waitress at "Pillow Talk" where most of the people were under age, spent their allowance on drinks, and I worked for tips. Not one of my better memories, nor Larry's. But there were times when it seemed worth it, like getting the crowd to clap and get Tom to come up on stage at 2:00am and sing "There Are No Fighter Pilots Down In Hell" (Tom Burkhead obviously an ex-fighter pilot).

The next six years or so Larry spent playing in bands with Dave. There were different bands, different players, but they seemed to remain the same people, just in different orders and times, each going from band to band. But what a lineup of players it was, including Bill Ball, Dave Vickers, Michael Wright, Bill Hinson, Austin Pettit, Randy Dix, Ron Barfield, Ron Taylor, Jimmy Oswald, and so many others.

But there was one band in particular that was different, consisting of Dave, Larry, and Bill Hoffman. There was no keyboard player so Larry bought a piano and filled in until they found someone they were happy with. As for a bass player, Dave suggested a guy he, John Lane and Bill had met and become friends with while playing in North Carolina in "Smiling Sideways". He was and remains a great bass player, soulful singer, and a person who is a joy in every way to play with and to know. His name is Harvey Arnold, who would become the bass player for "The Outlaws".

Shortly after, Bill and Dave would leave to become members of "The Henry Paul Band", and Dave Vickers and Larry form "The Wooden Nickel Band".

Larry moved to Tallahassee playing in an all original songs jazz-rock band called "Labamba". The members changed and became "The Muffin Men", playing more of a rock format.

Larry received an invitation to play at a dive resort on the tiny island of Bonaire, a sister island of Aruba and ended up staying for 9 years, diving and playing music. While there he was able to record and release 2 cds (with release parties stretching from the Caribbean to Tallahassee and back). He then returned to America living in Panama City where he wrote his novel "The Carnival Never Ends". I am proud to say that I have a signed copy.

And now he is back in Brevard, has a new group known as "Tight Squeezed" (a combination of the 2 bands he played in with Dave, "Tight Shoes" and "Fresh Squeezed"), who recently played at the tribute for Dave and Billy Van Riper, and I personally hope he decides to stay this time around.
