






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

VICTORY CHORDS AT THE METRO

People. Let me tell you about a little show I went to at the Metro on March 2nd.



The concert featured Lita Grey and The Victory Chords. Both of these bands are filled with veteran Brevard musicians who don't even know how to put on a bad live show.

For those who don't know, The Victory Chords is fronted by the one and only Cameron Brintle, formerly of Boys Go To War. Cameron is sort of the god-father of Brevard's indiescene. But Cameron's not the only notable musician in the line-up. He's joined by former Boys Go To War bass guitarist Shawn Kasper, who also played with the Spitvalves, drummer Kevin Flack, formerly of Jehovah Chang, and lead guitarist Robert Friddle.

In any case, The Victory Chords leveled the Metro stage with melodies so thick they stuck to in my head all night. Not to mention that Cameron is a first class front-man who brings not only musical and vocal skill but also wit and humor to the stage. (The movie Donnie Darko dominated the between-song dialogue.)

Do yourself a favor and catch The Victory Chords the next time the band plays live.

Not only was the talent grade-A House of Blues-ready, the Metro's hospitality is a notch above the rest. I think Joe and Wendy carry around liquor bottles in their back pockets because shots were getting tossed around ever time they walked passed a table.

Now I admit that my company was so awesome I'm not sure I could have had a bad time. But being at the Metro surrounded by friendly faces and Brevard's best live bands made it that much better.

On Friday April 20th the Metro is hosting goth-metal band, Lunatic Candy, Kreep. From the looks of things, you can expect a full sensory experience, from the music to the dress, from this four-piece Orlando band.

And look out for a Rock for Hunger charity event next month featuring Crop Circle, Vocal Drop, and more to be announced. Personally, I'm a sucker for a concert with a cause. I mean what's better than being able to say I just helped people in need after a night of music and partying?

TRADE SECRETS - ADVICE FROM THE ROAD

Recently Georgia based independent rock band Hybrid L performed at the Metro in Melbourne.

Hybrid L was awarded 2005 best rock act in middle Georgia by Eleventh Hour magazine and has shared the stage with bands such as Tantric, Saliva, and Staind.

The title track "Face Me Not" from Hybrid L's second CD

was featured on the soundtrack in independent film "Roulette," released in late 2005.

Most recently, the band worked with producer Corey Lowery, bass player for Dark New Day and formerly of Stereomud, on its fourth release. Hybrid L is now shopping its material to Columbia records.

Brevard Live recently spoke to Hybrid L's drummer, Mike Carmel, to find out the key to his band's success as an independent band. Aspiring local independent bands take note.

BL: Describe your music for the uninitiated.

MC: I would kind of lump us in the cat of a melodic hard rock.

BL: What's been the key to Hybrid L's success thus far?

MC: Honestly, its been nothing but our work ethic. There's been no person that's made connections or helped us out or really given us anything. It has all been hard earned, amongst ourselves. We apply the simple principle of going out there and putting on a great show. And hopefully we deliver great music on CD as well. But really it's about taking that music and launching it live. We see a lot of bands out there putting out a lot of great CDs but they can't come close to performing it live. And a lot of traveling.

BL: Talk about your band's live performance and how important it is to have a good live presence.

MC: It's a high energy show. It's exciting. There's no pyro, no tricks, no gadgets. People just really connect with the energy that we're trying to deliver from the stage and they reciprocate that energy. It's kind of a domino effect. Any band worth a grain of salt, they've got to blow me away live.

BL: How do you make money as a band?

MC: We make most of our money off the internal circle of the dates of touring. As you start splitting out further and further form your home-base you start to make less and less because you're not going to be drawing in as many people.

We make several thousands dollars at shows much closer to home and that

affords us to play outside of the area and make just a few hundred dollars.
We try to break even at least in costs.
You've got to keep your circle smart.

BL: You're sponsored by Jagermeister, No Fear, Arko and Level 27 clothing. How have they helped you?

MC: Jagermeister has been phenomenal to us. We're not just members we're also proud users. They've given us the opportunity to perform a lot of shows. Probably the biggest of which was Livestock 15 in Tampa last year. It was a two day festival and we actually got picked to play both dates. There were a lot of great bands there: Saliva, Hinder, Theory of a Deadman. It was a great festival with 20-30,000 people there.

MC TEXT CELEBRATES RELEASE OF NEW CD

This Hip-Hop artist appeals to rock tastes: On April 4th, rock influenced hip-hop artist, MC Text, will perform

along with Alias the @ikt upstairs at Gregory's Steak House in Cocoa Beach (900 N Atlantic Ave).

Based out of Merritt Island, MC Text, whose legal name is Robert Colella, is celebrating the release of his new release, "Release the Beast." An artist who prides himself on having his hands on every aspect of his music, MC Text produced, mixed and mastered the CD himself. He even wrote the vast majority of the music featured on the disk.

DAN JUNK - Along for the Ride 14 Song CD

Dan has fine tuned his direction on what I believe is his second record. I felt that his last record jumped around a bit too much stylistically but on Along for the Ride Junk focuses completely on his musical strength; upbeat, new age-ish, guitar based instrumentals. Although musically he has blossomed nicely since his last record, the production still suffers from the hideous electronic programmed drum tracks. Being a drummer myself I realize that we can be difficult to deal with at times, however, that just might be the key to Junk delivering a perfect third record. 

Joe Realino, bartender and manager of several

*s*cene cocktail lounges, had the idea to organize one major annual event rather than hastily organized benefit parties

that imposed on those who contributed.

Since its beginnings the Joe Realino Memorial Fund has raise over \$1 Million to

provide assistance. Three more parties are planned this year held in Palm Bay (Siggy's), Cocoa Beach and Titusville.













Brevard's Hard Rockers Survive:

THE AMERICAN IDOL ANTITHESIS: SUCH IS LIFE

Shows like American Idol have made music a popularity contest where artists become performers, songs become slogans and all that matters is 'winning.' Brevard's own Such Is Life is the American Idol antithesis.

People don't cherish the band because its produced five Cds, packed clubs from the County Line Saloon in Melbourne to Club Fuel in Daytona to the House of Blues in Orlando. Yes, they've done the festivals (Pensacola's Spring Fest, the Milwaukee Metal Fest and the Furnace Fest) and opened for national bands (OTEP, BloodLet, and American Head Charge). But accolades do not define the band. SIL is about trying to survive, something we can all relate to.

Survive is exactly what Brevard's most respected heavy-music band has done for nearly nine years. SIL's latest test came October last year when it lost two of its key members.

But members Hunter Daniels (vocals), Rob Harrington (guitar), Adam Foglia (guitar), and Ed Lopes (drums) remained resolute after the loss. They even decided to go ahead with a scheduled concert at the County Line Saloon in November, performing as a four-piece with Harrington on bass. With whispers that the show might be the band's last, SIL fans crowded the venue.

"A lot of people thought we were done," said vocalist Hunter Daniels in a recent interview. "They thought we broke up because they heard we lost a couple of guys." Not a chance! "We just kind of look at them and smile," said Daniels. "We ain't gonna go out like that."

Such determination defines SIL in every way. "The whole idea of the band is about rising up against the limitations in life," said Daniels.

Daniels said sharing that message and the music with its fan-base is one of the main reasons the band refuses to stay down for the count. "We're glad people dig our music," he said. "What's the point if they're not around? It's good to play for yourself but you're doing this, too, because you want them to feel what you're feeling when they hear one of your songs."

While he respects a variety of music genres, Daniels said he feels that heavy music helps best express these raw emotions. "It lets people get in touch with the beast within," said Daniels.

Think heavy music is soulless and mindless? SIL proves you wrong. "People who write heavy music off, that's fine," said Daniels. "To each their own. "I know a lot of people who never liked heavy music until they heard us.

They would come to see us, and they kind of opened their eyes a bit. They see it's more than just mindless cave-man grunts. There's actually intelligence behind it. And a decent message."

Anyone who has been to a SIL concert knows its music is less about anger and aggression than realizing the sturdy resolve buried deep within us all. So it's no surprise that Daniels believes his music is essentially positive. "It's born from pain," he said, "but it's about beating that pain." Guitarist Harrington recalls one poignant moment where the mesh of pain and perseverance came to a head for him. "We were on tour in the summer of 2002 in Milwaukee Wisconsin playing at the cellular one arena, opening for Arch Enemy," he said. "It was the biggest venue our band had ever played. Our set time was 4:00pm on a Friday; and I received word at the same time, the same day that my mother died. "One of the last things she said was how proud she was of me being on tour."

With blood, sweat, and tears poured into the mix it's no wonder that SIL's music is, above all, a psychological call to arms; a call to endure life's grueling agonies without giving in to defeat; a call to prevail despite life's punishing set-backs. The band's newest song to illustrate this theme is "Optimus-Prime." The track also speaks to the band's transformation. "We named it 'Optimus-Prime' because it's about transforming from where we are to where we're going to be," said Daniels. "There's just a new spark."

The band wrote the song coming to terms with changes in the band. "As soon as we got our shit together with the band, it was the first tune they wrote. I knew I wanted to write about what we had just gone through over the last few months. It's about picking up the pieces and going on."

Reciting part of the chorus Daniels said: "my lungs filled/ the blood I spilled is all my own/ home, a distant dream/ all alone/ feel like nothings real/ get it back, attack/ there are no appeals in the end".

Part of that transformation is the addition of bass guitarist Shawn Goree, who also plays bass for Lita Gray. Daniels said SIL will probably not, however, look for a new keyboardist. But whatever transformation its members are undergoing, Daniels said SIL's message is the same: "To deal with life, it is what it is; You're never alone; A lot of people go through a lot of the same shit. Just know your not alone. There are other people who've been there before."

Asked if he feels like his band's impact on the people in Brevard constitutes a degree of success Daniels said this: "It feels like we've succeeded already, even though we're not signed and we're not making any money at it. It feels like we've done it already. Kind of just gives us that confidence. And if the people who ever hear us feel that way, imagine if we do get signed."






planted firmly on the plank is to Grille. The restaurant is 500 feet out over the Atlantic on the Pier

My dining friend and I arrived in time to watch the sunset over the coast. The view from our seats was wonderful and watching the day end so gracefully was a relaxing start to our evening. Of course, the Jekel Riesling we ordered contributed to our relaxation. It is a very smooth yet sweet wine with a slight fruity zing that goes well with most anything. Of course, there are several other wines to choose from as well as beer, mixed drinks and sodas.

Atlantic Grille has a fabulous Escargot Stuffed Mushroom appetizer. The large snails are seasoned with garlic butter, baked in fresh mushroom tops and is served with garlic toast and thin strings of fried onions. The mixed texture of the stuffed mushrooms and the crispy fried onions complimented each other very well. Of course, if you're not counting calories, the onions are really good soaked in the leftover garlic butter.

If you aren't into Escargot they have several other appetizers like Oysters Rockefeller, Fried Alligator and Shrimp Cocktail to get you started-but don't get too carried away. Atlantic Grille's entrée selection satisfies seafood lovers as well as 'land lovers.' I had the best of both worlds with their generously portioned Filet and Shrimp. The thick filet was served with a creamy Béarnaise on the side, a baked potato and delicious zucchini.

My dining friend had the Steamed Mussels, which were excellent. The mussels were served over pasta with a garlic sauce and finished with zucchini slices and sprinkled parmesan and herbs.

We didn't think we would make it to dessert, but were persuaded into ordering small portions of two desserts. We tried the Rum Glazed Bread Pudding and Rickie's Hot Fudge. The bread pudding was phenomenal. The custard was topped with a warm buttery rum sauce and whipped cream. And Rickie's Hot Fudge was sinful. It's a chocolaty moist brownie on vanilla ice cream with rich hot fudge and whipped cream.



GET READY FOR SPRING: LOOSE WEIGHT, DETOX AND TONE UP



WITHA LACUESTA

itha Lacuesta has a love of color, and a devotion to the natural environment. Her focus is to transfer these loves to her paintings. "I don't paint aggression," she said. "My paintings have a calmer feeling. I want people to feel pleasantly touched." It's easy to see that Lacuesta has achieved this goal. Through her watercolor paintings, she says that she works to provide viewers with a sanctuary where they can quietly reflect.

Lacuesta comes from a family of artists. Her childhood and formative years were steeped in and defined by a long lineage of artists and those who studied art seriously. She grew up in Germany. Her great grandfather was a collector of art and had a wonderful collection. Unfortunately, it was burned in a fire during World War II. Her great uncle was a sculptor. He worked on cathedral ceilings in Europe. Her grandmother designed clothes.

Lacuesta received valuable gifts from her parents. From her father, she received an appreciation of fine art. He painted as a hobby and created in both watercolor and using pen and ink. His greatest contribution is that he was their personal tour guide of the art world. During her youth, Lacuesta's father took them on art tours throughout Europe for 5 or 6 weeks every summer. They visited all the great museums. Lacuesta made daily drawings of her travels. Imagine the Louvre and the Vatican as your classrooms.

From her mother, she received her love of flowers. In addition, she said that her mother imparted her extreme sense of color and harmony to her. Lacuesta shares her world of art with her sister,

Friederun Friederichs. Friederichs specializes in mixed media. She lives in Germany and usually comes here for about 6 weeks per year. As a book artist, she participated in the show at the Brevard Museum of Art and Science in 2006. Each year Lacuesta and her sister travel in Europe where they challenge each other and work to learn and perfect new techniques.

Lacuesta has always painted. European education is very structured. The schools provide only one hour of art per week. To supplement this, she took classes in the museum school in Frankfurt from the age of fourteen. She experimented in all areas of art, including ceramics, enameling, drawing, painting, and basket weaving.

Lacuesta has held several demanding jobs throughout the years. She always managed to use her artistic talents in all of them. She studied medical technology in Germany. Unlike that field of study here, in Europe it is more complex. It includes medical photography, histology, x-ray, etc. For histology, for example, it was her job to make detailed, precise drawings from a microscopic perspective.

Before becoming a full-time artist, Lacuesta held positions as varied as pharmaceutical representative, library assistant, cartographer, teacher of geography, and art teacher.

Lacuesta came to the United States to live in 1967. She stayed three years. While here, she sold some watercolor paintings in a small gallery in California. In 1970, she returned to Germany and stayed for 15 years. During that time, she continued to paint and did some enameling of jewelry. One of her jobs was to work in a cancer rehab clinic teaching patients to enamel. She found the artwork provided a pleasant distraction to patients who were so in need of a different focus.

In the mid-1980s, Lacuesta met her husband through a friend. He was from the United States and was stationed in Germany. In 1984, they married and took up residence in Massachusetts where he was stationed. Lacuesta continued to work her painting around raising children and a variety of jobs. It wasn't until her husband retired and they moved to Florida in 1998 that she began to paint full time.


Initially, she took some classes from Fran McClean, who suggested she join the Brevard Watercolor Society. Through the Brevard Watercolor Society, she participated in the Old Brevard project where they painted from historical black and white photographs of Brevard. Her first historic painting was of a fisherman from Grant. She received an honorable mention award for that. She found the project fascinating because she felt she had to understand the history in order to use the proper colors. For the next historic show, she painted pineapples and bananas in a cart with a mule and river. She won Best of Show for that painting.

In addition to the Brevard Watercolor Society, Lacuesta belongs to the Vero Beach Art Club and the Brevard Cultural Alliance, and she is the Artist in Residence for Coquina Elementary School in Titusville, Florida. In 2006, she joined the Fifth Avenue Art Gallery and regularly displays pieces of her work there.

Lacuesta commented that she loves to paint and try new things. She is so enthused about her artwork that she admits that sometimes she needs to remind herself to sleep. She likes to work on large paintings. She usually spends a great deal of time composing and visualizing the colors. Once she has put in the time with the painting in her head, she said that she paints quite rapidly.

She has an upcoming show at the Merritt Island National Wildlife Refuge. Her works of wildlife, flora and fauna will hang in the Visitor Center during April and May. Also, she will have 20 pieces in the Mixed-Up Media show at the A.E. Backus Museum and Gallery in Fort Pierce, Florida. This show is scheduled for April 3-21, 2007. In May, she will have pieces in the Shakespeare Theatre in Orlando, and in July, she will participate in Harbor Sights, a member show of the Fifth Avenue Art Gallery.



Tith all the talk of the upcoming Brevard Live Music Awards, I can't help but think of Dave Fiester, and back to the very first music award which was presented to him in 2003. There was one category at that time for the music awards, 'Entertainer of the Year', and it was presented to Dave. He sent myself and my husband John Lane tickets as his guests, and of course Bill Hoffman as well. The Austin Pettit Band featuring the one and only Debby Boyer was the host band of the entire affair. I was so happy and proud to be a part of it all. Every musician I have ever known from Brevard and more were there to see Dave honored. And for me, it was especially great to have the individuals I mentioned above in the same room at the same time. It had been so long since that had happened, I could hardly remember the last time. And all the many years that Dave had been so special to me as a musician, and now he was being told by his peers that they felt

the same as I did. It wasn't like Dave had never received recognition, but this was the first time I was actually there to see it, what a feeling.

Austin's band performed, there was no lacking for food and liquor, or seeing people you had not seen for a while. It was just a very special night and occasion in every way, and I will never forget it.

The band (Austin Pettit Band) stopped and the ceremonies began. Heike Clarke walked on to the stage to present Dave with his award, and as I watched, Dave fell into one of his combination humble and shy modes. Heike presented Dave with the award, and afterwards as Dave and his friends would have it, on came the jam. And what a jam it was, with musicians joining in such as Steve Miller, Austin Pettit, John Lane, Bill Hoffman, Michael Wright, and Mark Glisson, just to name

a few. Everyone was taking turns and the stage was completely packed at all times. And as the night went on, I was sitting in my chair, everything almost seeming unreal, and it was then that Dave walked up to the microphone and made the announcement that he wanted the two people who had taught him to play the blues to join him on stage. He then called up John and Bill. John made the comment to me that he didn't believe that Dave meant that he and Bill had taught him how to play the blues. Rather they had brought him more into the world of jamming which was still a rather unknown concept in this area, just beginning to find some musicians such as Robbin Thompson who had begun to experiment with it to a point.

Brevard has been blessed with so many extraordinary musicians that they have at times been taken for granted, by myself included. But I think about all those from our little community with the ability to give us the greatest jams we would ever have a chance to hear, and all we had to do was drive a couple of miles to hear them on almost any weekend night. And what makes a jam so special is that not all musicians possess the talent to perform one, because it goes being good musically. It's a special talent all its own. And according to my husband John, it was Bill Hoffman who brought this concept with him from California to Satellite Beach and south Brevard, taught it to John for one, who of course immediately loved it, along with others like Dave and Austin.

Bill had moved to Satellite from an area which was not only already very familiar with jamming (which began in the mid 60's), but had produced a band that to this day is still known as the

most famous jam band to exist, and that would be none other than the 'Grateful Dead', along with a band from England known as 'Cream'. Others to come along in the early days of jamming were bands such as The Allman Brothers, Hot Tuna, Frank Zappa, Pink Floyd, Jefferson Airplane, Jimi Hendrix, Santana, The Doors'...the list just goes on and on. They were known as jam bands due

to their lengthy improvisations, feeling free to break away and deviate from the structured music, playing what they felt and wanted to play, sometimes almost as a test to themselves to see what they could do and contribute of their own.

Of course it would catch on here in Brevard, to the point that the local musicians went out seeking a jam, or if they ran into a club where someone they knew was playing, the entertainment for the night usually quickly turned into one. At least for as long as the band could get away with it. After all, you still had to keep the club owners satisfied which meant keeping the cliental dancing and buying drinks. For those of you who have tried to dance to Liz Reed'...






Longtime friend, bandmate and jam partner Austin Pettit will host the Dave Fiester Jam at The Reunion Concert on April 22, at Lou's Blues.
